From The Pastor's Heart

With the warming up of the weather and the lengthening of the days, more and more people can be seen going for a walk. The task of walking is so simple yet so therapeutic. Most people will head outdoors to enjoy this activity in the spring and fall more than summer or winter. Spring is actually the most popular season for walkers to be out and about. Why? Besides the milder temperatures and longer days, there is a newness to the season that instills hope to our winter souls. It is interesting that spring and fall are seen as seasons in transition. The spring leads us into summer. The fall leads us into winter. Both summer and winter are often seen as seasons in which we have arrived (though not in a positive way) and longingly await the next season to come. Of course, beach bums and snow bunnies won't agree with this, but for the majority of people this is true.

It is then, in turn, interesting that while we love the transitional seasons that creation offers us, we do not so much enjoy the transitional seasons of life. We actually try to rush through them. We look and long to "arrive" at whatever we are hoping for. Maybe we want to arrive at a new job. Maybe we want to arrive at a new house, a new relationship, a restored sense of purpose, or a hard worked for health goal. Yet it is in the in between times that we learn so much and grow so much. It is the journey that we tend to spend more time talking about and telling stories of than the destination itself.

Our church right now is on a journey. I pray that while we are in times of transition you may be patient and settle into this season of change and the process of discernment that goes along with it. At our March administrative board meeting we voted on exploring a model known as the Simplified Accountable Structure. This model looks at the potential to revamp our administrative life together. We are made up of many committees. Those committees vary in responsibility. Four of the committees — the Administrative Council, the Staff Pastor Parish Relations Committee, the Finance Committee and the Trustees Committee — make up our administrative life. The SAS model would focus on simplifying our administrative life and combining down to one board. The two key factors into this "One Board" being effective is accountability and communication.

I want to be clear, we have not voted to make the change to the Simplified Accountable Structure; you all will be a part of that vote when and if it comes. We have simply voted to explore the SAS model. This leads us to a lengthy season of discernment. We have started with discerning that it is time to intentionally make some changes for our growing and shifting life together. As our leaders and volunteers continue to be faithfully committed to the life of God's kingdom in this place, a restructuring can simply build on the great community we already have and prolong our missional life together. Like spring, we can be a breath of new life for so many and a continued place of hope and joy for all of the seasons in which we are in.

Don't hesitate to reach out to me or any member of council with any questions you may have and know you will be hearing more about this and will be given opportunities to be a part of this important transitional time! And as always, be in prayer for us.



nations—Poland, Hungary, Romania and Slovakia—to support those who remain in Ukraine as well as those who have fled the violence. In addition, grants are being awarded to partners like ACT Alliance, International Orthodox Christian Charities (IOCC) and Human Rights League. These grants are providing transportation assistance, humanitarian supplies such as food, water, clothing, shelter and medication, as well as legal services and safe spaces for women, children and those with disabilities. UMCOR is in continuous dialogue with UMC entities and other partners throughout Europe to identify additional ways to assist. The situation in Eastern and Central Europe is evolving and Global Ministries and UMCOR will continue to respond in the months and years ahead. We planted a sign in the church lawn, urging prayer for Ukraine.

We gathered live on Facebook, lifting prayer for Ukraine.

We wore blue and gold ribbons, created by women in the church family, urging prayer for Ukraine.

We stood in the sanctuary on Sunday mornings as Pastor Hannah lifted prayer for Ukraine.

"Lord, we ask for your mighty works to be done in Ukraine," Hannah requested through our corporate prayer. "We will come to you again, we will return week after week, asking for your miracles to show up, Lord, for you to turn those hearts of stone and set them with compassion."

We filled March with prayer for Ukraine and all of those in Europe and around the world impacted by Russia's aggression. We prayed for those living with the realities of war; death and injury and destruction and fear and hunger and separation.

We step into April lifting and urging and persisting in prayer for Ukraine.


We persist in prayer, perhaps, because of Easter. We persist because Jesus, on the eve of his crucifixion, knelt and prayed in the garden, "Father, if you are willing, take this cup from me; yet not my will but yours be done."

Do you remember the next line in Chapter 22 of Luke's Gospel? I didn't, until I began writing this prayer prompt. The sequence is extraordinary.

"An angel from heaven appeared to him and strengthened him."

God was listening. He responded immediately. He doesn't appear to take the cup, but it was clear that God was engaged, He was aware and alive and moving, fortifying the suffering. He sent an angel to gift Jesus with new strength.

How did Jesus use this new strength? Did he rise to meet the conflict? Did he stride confidently toward confrontation?



No. The renewed Jesus persisted in prayer. He continued the conversation. He patiently extended his exploration of God's will.

Luke writes, "And being in anguish, he prayed more earnestly, and his sweat was like drops of blood falling to the ground."

Wouldn't we love to know something about the prayers that followed the angel's visit? I feel like he probably continued the conversation with much thanksgiving and praise and trust.

The content of the prayer is lost, but the model
Jesus set in persisting in prayer remains with us, always. Pray, and
then pray again. The world changed for all of us in the hours and days
that followed the extended prayer of Jesus.

Let's persist in prayer for the conflict in Ukraine and all who are shaken by it. Let's continue the conversation. Let's extend in faith and trust and thanksgiving.

On April 3, as the sun sets around 7:47 pm, from wherever you are, with whomever will join you, let's pray again for peace in Ukraine, peace in Russia, peace in Europe, peace in the refugee settlements ... we don't have to be limited. Let's pray into famine and war in East Africa, to conflict, oppression and fear in places such as Afghanistan, Yemen, Haiti, Central America and Myanmar. Let's pray into racism and exclusion, violence and oppression, hunger and addiction.

Your prayer doesn't have to be at sunset. Persist at any hour and know that God is listening. He is aware and alive and moving in a world that persists in prayer, who have faith in His will.

"We want to affirm again that you are good, that you are holy and that you are alive and at work" Hannah said in a Sunday morning prayer. "And that we may not always see how, or feel it, or know it, we believe it. We will continue to profess that faith even when it his hard, even when we are tired, even when it sometimes feels so out of control. And we also claim that we are never without hope."

In our prayer, we can repeat the words of Jesus.

"... not my will but yours be done."

EVENTS OF CLOCK TOWER SUNDAY SEPTEMBER 15, 1996

The day dawned cloudy and cool, and the doubts began to build in the minds of the committee, as we began to set up chairs and tables on the lawn. The Choir Institute arrived to set up their speakers system. The day of Dedication had come.

Sunday School students of all ages arrived and gathered in the sanctuary, because the Simpson Room was set up for lunch. At the conclusion of the opening the Nursery Class went outside to view the contents of the time capsule, spread out on two tables on the lawn. The Confirmation Class assisted in explaining and reading to the children. Each class, through the teens, came in turn to view history in the making.

Worship began at 11, a service of praise of God which featured Rev. Paul Schrading, assistant to Bishop George Bashore and former District Superintendent of the Pittsburgh District, who preached on the topic: "It's High Time!" Dr. Schrading reminded us that there two words in Greek that are translated "Time". One is Chronos, time as marked by a clock, the passage of minutes and hours; the other is Kyros, which is God's time, time with meaning. In the rededication of the Tower the two comes together – reminding us of God's place in all what we do, in mission as the Church.

Our worship closed with the congregations singing "Lord, Speak to Me" and processing outside. (The rain that fell during the service had stopped!) Jack Morrow reviewed the story of the removal of the original time capsule and our disappointment that almost everything turned to dust, then reminded us of the opportunity to leave a legacy for the future. Bill Scott and Alexis Kunsak placed the time capsule into the opening, and Rev. Schrading and Rev. Bradley inserted the stone, and shared prayers for the Re-laying of the Cornerstone. Just as the stone was pushed in place the clock struck noon, its twelve rings seeming to affirm all that was happening. (God's Holy Spirit was surely shining on us, as we completed that worship a full five minutes ahead of schedule!)

After saying grace, the congregation moved to the Simpson Room to share a delicious croissant sandwich box lunch and Christian fellowship until 12:30 p.m.

Throughout the luncheon people came and filled the lawn, visiting until the arrival of the Sewickley Choir Institute, the Full-Gospel Mini Band (4 trumpets) and our Cancel Choir who filled the air with beautiful praise until 12:59. Confirmation class students distributed programs and greeted those who came.

Conservatively, 300 people, both citizens of the community and church members, stood and sat in the silence following the music ... silence that was broken by the single chime of the Church Bell, followed by the chimes playing "Come, Ye Thankful People, Come". As the last notes echoed away the pastor began the Invocation (only to be interrupted by the daily test of the Fire Horn from the Borough Building down Thorn Street.) Amid the laughter, prayer continued.

Jim Theys greeted those present, and introduced the special guests who were gathered to share in our celebration and receive our thanks. He indicated that one of the empty chairs in the front row of the platform was reserved for Pete Wagner, who had been our construction supervisor until his death, last year.

Paul Collier shared a capsule review of the history of the church and the clock tower. He shared some basic facts and some humorous incidents from the past.

Mayor Ken Johns, who proudly claimed to be a descendent of the builder of the church and tower, read his declaration of Sunday, September 15 as Clock Tower Day in Sewickley.

Malachi Whalen spoke for the Borough Council, Elisa Cavalier for Pittsburgh History and Landmarks, Paul Schrading for the Bishop, each expressing the support of the Tower Project.

The Saints Plaque, listing those who contributed more than \$1,000 was unveiled by Paul Collier, following words of appreciation from Bob Fulton, Chairperson of the Church's Administrative Board.

Rev. Bradley shared a word to the future, reminding everyone that we need to continue our spirit of cooperation, not just for the good of the clock but for all that we share as residents of this community.

The Combined Choirs sang the "Battle Hymn of the Republic," ending with the glorious sound of trumpets. In the silence that echoed following the applause of all present, the choirs began to move as the clock struck twice, its own applause for the glorious praise which had just been experienced.

A prayer of dedication was prayed by Rev. Bradley for the Church, Rev. Thomas Moog, pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, representing the religious community of Sewickley and Rev. Schrading representing the Bishop and the United Methodist Church. As a final act, a litany of unity was led by Tom Wright, with all present responding "TOGETHER WE STAND AND EXPERIENCE THE FLOW OF GOD'S GIFT OF TIME."

The afternoon ended with a reception, a beautiful cake baked and decorated by Judy Hetzell along with cookies and punch allowed people to linger and share their own memories of the church and the clock.

As the crew removed the chairs and took down the tents, the rain began again. A crisp autumnish day ended with rain falling around the tower, as it has for more than a century. The clock continued to strike the hours, Sewickley was comfortable once again. Thanks to all who have worked and supported the Village Clock Tower Project.

This day was a very exciting day with the completion of the reconstruction of the clock tower and restoring the clock. We inserted a new time capsule into the cornerstone to be opened in one hundred years (2096).
