## The Pastor's Peace

After getting back in the car from picking Lincoln up at daycare, Jordyn insisted that I watch the video she recorded on her iPad while she was waiting for us. I assumed it would be of a song she was singing or a story she made up, but it wasn't. Instead, it was of a beautiful gift that nature gives. This gift seems to show up particularly when people are grieving and need to be reminded of their loved ones. She filmed a red cardinal. The vibrant, jewel toned ruby red feathers were a stark contrast to the light brown bareness of the branches with no leaves or buds to call its own. In the bleakness of the cold harsh reality of the impending death of the tree, life graced its limbs. This picture is one that people who find themselves in their own sorrow, needing a message of hope, often paint. I have heard story after story of those who have recently experienced hard loss receive a visit from a red cardinal. It wasn't as if they just saw this beautiful bird flying around, but the stories usually involved how the bird seemed very intentional about its visit to that person. According to many different sources you will find, it is thought that a red cardinal is a spiritual sign and reminder that even after someone you love has passed, they still live on. Therefore,



the cardinal has become a sign and reminder of life in the midst of death, of hope in the midst of sorrow.

As we will soon face the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem and then the brutal hanging of our Lord on a cross, we will be led through our own celebrations and tears. We will be reminded that some joys have timelines shorter than we would like and some hurts seem to go on forever. This journey, however, does not stop at Jesus' death on the cross; it does not stop at the silence of the days to follow; it does not stop at the empty tomb; it does not stop at the resurrection; it does not stop at the ascension; it does not stop at the falling of the church as we know it; it does not stop with our last breath; it does not stop. The journey we are on, walking with Jesus, goes on for all eternity. What we face here and now is temporary, like a tree that once was but is no more. What we will face then is yet to be known but, like the red Cardinal that is a sign and reminder of life in the midst of death and of hope in the midst of sorrow, we know because our Savior lives. We can face tomorrow.

Take a look all around you. Appreciate the signs of life that humble your Spirit and set a heart of worship within you. Then don't hold back or be afraid to shine. People need your bright colors to show through the harsh realities all around us. Better days are yet to come, but the ones we are in can be good too. Amen!



Have you ever heard the phrase, "come down off your high horse?" The Urbandictonary.com tells us this phrase is used when someone is in an argument and refuses to admit they are wrong and keeps acting "holier-than-thou." Before we head into Passion Week, where we read and remember the scriptures that lead to the death and resurrection of Christ, we pause for a celebratory moment that has come to be known as Palm Sunday. What we find in this pause is Jesus, who is "holier-than-thou," doesn't arrive to a throng of cheering crowds on his high horse; he arrives on a donkey. Why a donkey and what can we learn from this act of humility?

Message: "In or Out?"





Our 2023 Operation Christmas Child is accelerating into spring.

The Fellowship of the Cross conducted a March inventory that revealed we have more than

enough stuffed animals, sunglasses, scissors and rulers to accommodate 100 boxes. We're grateful to those who have made contributions through the winter.

We will be collecting gift items to fill the Christmas shoeboxes through September. This is the SUMC family's 13th year of contributing to Operation Christmas Child, and we have filled more than 1,300 boxes in the past 12 years.

The FOTC donation box is located outside the church office, on a shelf beneath the bulletin board.

Suggested donations include school supplies (pens, pencils, crayons, notebooks and glue sticks), wearables (T-shirts, socks, caps), personal grooming items (brushes, combs, toothbrushes) and "wow" gifts such as dolls, balls, jewelry, hair accessories, toy cars.

Our 2022 OCC boxes reached children in South Africa, Liberia, Honduras and Ecuador. In previous years, our boxes journeyed to the Dominican Republic, Columbia, the Bahamas, Ukraine, multiple nations in Africa and to a country that could not be revealed for security reasons.

Sewickley Methodist Episcopal Church, Rev. Dr. R. Emory Beetham and the Great War by Warren Kinneer, SUMC Historian

Our church secretary, Pam Honeychurch, recently received a note with a postcard enclosed from a woman named Diana from Indiana. She thought our church would like to have the postcard for our history files. The postcard was originally mailed to young brothers, Robert and John McCann of Hill Street, Sewickley, in December 1918. The big question was who is Rev. Dr. Robert Emory Beetham? I have done some research on him and his time here in Sewickley. Church records show he was here 1914 to 1919. He and his wife, Harriett, served the Sewickley Methodist Episcopal Church for five years, which back then was a long time for a pastor to stay in one place. The pastoral couple must have been well loved by the church. When Dr. Beetham went off to France as a chaplain during the Great War, the church voted to give Harriett a \$25 monthly allowance to help her though the six months he was gone for the war effort

As the war in Europe heated up, so did the village of Sewickley. At the March 25, 1918 Official (Church) Board meeting, they approved to allow the Liberty-Loan Committees to use the church's auditorium for a public meeting. At the same meeting Dr. Beetham advised the Board that his application for a place in the YMCA organization for duty "Overseas" had been accepted. He therefore asked that the Official Board grant him a furlough of at least six months, provided satisfactory arrangement with the Bishop and the Board, relative to pulpit supply and salary could be made. It was moved by George Mark and duly seconded, that the Board grant Dr. Beetham's request for at least 6 month's leave of absence provided arrangements be made before his departure to protect the interests of the church during his absence. Carried. It was moved and duly seconded that a committee

of five be appointed to cooperate with the Pastor and District Superintendent in obtaining the Bishop's release and in securing pulpit supply. etc. Carried. The pastor appointed Brothers Cunningham, Diehl, Chesborough, Rosensteel and Mark as a committee.

On April 7, 1918, a call of the President of the Board met after services. The above Committee reported that the Bishop had approved the action of the Board in releasing Dr. Beetham and advised the Board that Dr. Flannigan had been engaged to assume the Pastor's duties in his absence at a salary of \$150 per month. Upon motion, duly seconded, the action of the committee was approved.

On May 20, 1918, the monthly meeting of the Board was held with the Dr. David Flannigan, interim pastor, presiding. It was moved and duly seconded that a committee be appointed to canvas the membership to raise funds to cover the cost of a bronze tablet, similar to that advertised by Jos. H. Matthews Co. of Pittsburgh, to carry the Honor Roll of our church, and to purchase the tablet and place it as soon as practicable upon the walls of the church. JC Venning, historian, will furnish a roster of the men who are serving their country. Dr. Flannigan appointed Mrs. Gilmore, Mrs. Kunkle, Mrs. Moore, and Mrs. McDonald to serve on this committee.

It was moved and duly seconded that the sum of \$25 per month the church saves through the procuring of the services of Dr. Flannigan at \$150 per month, should be turned over by the Treasurer to Mrs. Beetham. Carried. The Secretary was requested to advise Dr. Beetham of this action and get his consent to relieve the Treasurer of responsibility in paying Mrs. Beetham.

On June 17, 1918 the Tablet committee reported that an order had been placed with the Jos. H. Matthews Co. for one of their tablets and that plans were being worked out to raise the necessary fund to cover the cost.


In order to have the financing of the Bronze Tablet brought to the attention of the membership, for the raising of the necessary money, action was taken placing Professor Mark and Dr. Flannigan on the committee. It was also directed that the Bulletin of June 23 should carry an announcement that a special collection would be taken on June 30 for the Tablet Fund.

At the July 15, 1918, Official Board meeting the secretary was instructed to write to Dr. Beetham, a letter of fraternal greeting, conveying to him church news, best wishes, and kind regards of the Board members. The secretary read a letter from Dr. Beetham dated July 7, 1918,

It was moved by WW Cunningham, seconded by AH Diehl, that a committee be appointed to prepare a resolution endorsing the pastorate for Dr. Beetham and asking for his reappointment for the ensuing year. The resolution was to be presented to the District Superintendent at the 4th Quarterly Conference to be held on September 26, 1918. Motion carried.

A Special Meeting was held December 8, 1918, immediately after the morning service so the Official Board might arrange to show its appreciation of Dr. Beetham's services abroad upon his return. To accomplish this, it was decided to have a "reception" in which the other churches and the Borough itself





#### might participate.

On December 18, 1918, the regular monthly meeting of the Official Board met with the pastor, Dr. R Emory Beetham, presiding. It was moved by JC Venning and duly seconded that the Board to assume the cost of the refreshments served at the reception given to Dr. Beetham upon his return from France in amount \$24.79. The bill was therefore ordered paid.

Dr. Beetham was the presiding president of the Official Board January through October. The Beethams were granted a month vacation in July to be used at such a time as best suited.

On October 5, 1919, a Special meeting of the Official Board was held in the auditorium at the close of the morning services to ascertain what action that it desired taken upon learning that Dr. Beetham would not be reappointed to this pastorate. A special committee and as many of them as possible should go to Uniontown to confer with the District Superintendent and others in the interest of this congregation relative to the appointment of a new pastor for the current year, Carried.

This information about Dr. R. Emory Beetham was mainly taken from the 1918 and 1919 Official Board Meetings Minutes. There is very little written about the personal lives of our ministers and sometimes we must read in-between the lines for insights. The Beethams were in Sewickley during the Spanish Flu outbreak and the Great War in Europe. The brass tablet was purchased and mounted on the wall of the Narthex and has the names of service members from our church who served in the Great War (World War I) in Europe. Dr. Beetham name is listed on the tablet.

## MET IN AFRICA---WEDDED

Cupid Followed the Trail From Rhodesia to Elmer, New Jersey, Where Miss Johnson Became the Bride of a Clergyman

ELMER, N. J., Nov. 16.—A pretty wedding took place at the home of Mrs. Sarah Johnson, this afternoon, when her daughter. Miss Harriet Elwell Johnson, was united in marriage to Rev. Robert Emory Beetham, of New Concord', Ohio, by Bishop J. C. Hartzell, of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The bride was attired in white silk and wore orange blossoms that were worn by her mother when the latter was married to the late Isaac Johnson. A gold chain with a heart pendant about the bride's neck was the gitt of the groom. Miss Amelia Jehnings, of Haddonfield, N. J., was maid of honor, and Hartley C. Johnson, brother of the bride, was best man. The bride was given away by her grandmother, Mrs. Harriet Elwell.

After receiving the congratulations of their friends the couple left on the 5.20 train for a trip through the Northern States.

with the expectation of spending five years there. At the end of two and a half years she was obliged, on account of ill health, having received an injury while horseback riding, to return to America. After reaching home she went to a hospital in New York city for treatment, and was told by the physicians that she could never be well should she return to Africa.

Mrs. Beetham is highly accomplished and well educated. She taught for several years in different public schools in the State and three years in the city of Newark. While teaching in Newark she became acquainted with Rev. Dr. J. C. Hartzell, bishop of the Methodist Episcopal Church to Africa, who was so impressed with her ability as a teacher and musician that he prevailed upon her to go to New Umtali, Rhodesia, British Africa, and teach kindergarten methods and music in the academy there. Accordingly in April, 1901, she left home and friends

Rev. Dr. Robert Emory Beetham was born 6-13-1874 in Bedford, Ohio. Harriet Elwell Johnson was born about 1875 in New Jersey. The two met in New Umtali, Rhodesia (modern day Mutare, Zimbabwe), where she taught kindergarten and music in a mission school and he was a teacher and school principal. They married on November 16, 1903 in Elmer, N.J. After forty years in Ministry they retired to Daytona Beach, Florida where he died on December 4, 1947. He is buried in Cadiz, Ohio. His wife of fortythree years passed away on January 11, 1954.

Did you know you can dial 911 for an emergency situation which may arise at the church?

The Safety and Security Ministry at SUMC recommends the following protocol in the event of an emergency on site at the church:

Dial 911 on your mobile phone. **DO NOT HANG UP until the dispatcher tells you to do so**. Information you will be asked to provide may include:

- Address of the emergency: our church address is 337 Broad Street, Sewickley, PA 15143
- Description of the emergency and required need for help
- Explain the current assistance that has been provided to the person(s) in need
- Specify the location within the building (reference the door numbers if possible)

Without putting yourself in harm's way, in the case of an active shooter, it will be helpful to provide the 911 dispatcher with this information:

- The location of shooter within the building (reference door numbers if possible)
- The number of shooters
- Description of shooter—physical features, clothing, race, gender
- Number and type of weapons held by shooter(s)
- Location and number of victim(s) or hostage(s) within the building

DO NOT HANG UP - EVERYTHING THE DISPATCHER CAN HEAR IN THE BACKGROUND COULD BE HELPFUL.

When I heard Pastor Hannah was planning a Lenten series on humility, I shrugged. Honestly, where's the electricity in humility?

A window to mission and ministry. A light into love, joy and peace. An energy for prayer, surrender and inclusivity.


In the first leg of the series, Hannah suggested that "thinking of others more often, lifting others up, fighting for a good that is bigger than yourselves, this is the leadership of humility."

In the second part of the series, she reminded us that "humility has the power to bring together what so many have sought to divide."

In the series, Hannah urged us to "practice wonder" and "be teachable" and to "ask for help."

"We all have something to teach, and we all have more to learn," she said.

Hannah, in the third week, urged believers in liberal news media to switch, on occasion, to conservative news outlets. Search for commonality, she said.



I want more of the humility that Hannah found in Jesus, in scripture.

Let's pray for humility on April 2.

On Palm Sunday, as the sun sets about 7:46pm, from wherever you are, with whomever wants to join you, lets pray for humility. Let's ask God to share His humility with us in ways that will change our perspectives and lift, encourage and invite those arounds us.

On Palm Sunday, we remember that Jesus was welcomed by a crowd, many of them drawn by

His humility. He listened. He made others feel valued. He made their needs His priority.

Let's pray for a Jesus-like humility in our family relationships. Let's pray for a Jesus-like humility in our relationships at school and in our work places.

Let's pray for a Jesus-like humility as we move through our neighborhoods.

Let's pray for a Jesus-like humility in all that we do as a church. Let's ask our God to provide a light that allows us to listen, to see each other, to lift each other, to learn from each other, to serve each other, to value each other.

Let's pray for a humility that, as Hannah suggested, "can bring together communities and tear down walls."

Life Line Screening, the nation's leading provider of preventive health screenings, will offer affordable, non-invasive and painless health screenings at Sewickley United Methodist Church on **Wednesday, April 19**.



A package of four screenings to identify risk for stroke, heart disease and other chronic conditions will be offered:

- 1. **Carotid Artery Screening** (Plaque) An ultrasound is performed to screen the carotid arteries (a pair of blood vessels in the neck that deliver blood to your brain) for buildup of fatty plaque. This buildup, called atherosclerosis, is one of the leading causes of stroke.
- 2. **Peripheral Arterial Disease Screening** An Ankle-Brachial Index (ABI) test is performed using blood pressure cuffs on the arms and legs. It is important to screen for PAD because it increases the risk of coronary artery disease, heart attack, or stroke.
- 3. **Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm** (AAA) An ultrasound is performed to screen the abdominal aorta for the presence of an enlargement or aneurysm. AAA can lead to a ruptured aortic artery, which is a serious medical emergency.
- 4. **Atrial Fibrillation** A 6-lead electrocardiogram (EKG) is performed by placing sensors on the arms and legs to screen for Atrial Fibrillation. AFib can lead to blood clots, stroke, and heart failure, and other heart-related complications.

These 4 vital screenings cost \$149 and take 60-90 minutes to complete. Register by calling toll free 1-844-591-7160, text the word "circle" to 216-279-1607 or online at https://llsa.social/HC.
