Thank you! And YES!!! The Fellowship of the Cross youth are sending a heartfelt "thank you" to the Operation Christmas Child benefactor who, every year, provides sunglasses for every shoe box. We found the donation in our collection bin in March. Sunglasses are fun, practical, thoughtful contributions to our ministry. We also send a "thank you" to God for all of you who keep OCC in mind throughout the year. The emphatic "YES" is for the mother from the young SUMC family who recently asked if we accept "gently-used" contributions. We like to think of them as "gently-loved" and they have been a key component of our OCC drives since the evening we first gathered in the church library in 2011.

The FOTC originals filled our first boxes with stuffed animals and jewelry and art supplies and school supplies from their personal collections. We have been blessed several times over the years by families who have donated stuffed animal collections. These are the furry companions who have been sitting on shelves, not the ones hugged through every bout with the flu. Children who like blocks and cars and rockets might donate the crayons and markers that went unused. Those who love art supplies might have dinosaurs or ball caps or bull dozers that have been untouched. We have been sorting gifts for 13 years. We're willing to do the work. If your spring cleaning has you clearing drawers and closets, and the space beneath the beds, we're willing to accept the treasure you find.

As always, we accept new gifts year-round. We're gathering toys, stuffed animals, school supplies, jewelry, combs and brushes, toothbrushes, ball caps, socks, T-shirts, puzzles and books. Our collection bins are located outside the church office and in the narthex. In 13 years, we have put more than 1,400 shoe boxes into the hands of children on four continents.

April 7, 2024 Second Sunday of Easter Sacrament of Holy Communion Liturgist: Kristine Swaney Scripture Lesson: Psalm 119:105-112 Message: "Here's My Heart"

"Though Peter's story does not end with the conclusion of the gospels, we finish our series with Peter's encounter with the risen Christ. In this final week, we come full circle with Peter. He has dropped his nets, walked on water, professed his faith, been rebuked, received foot washing, denied Jesus, and run to the tomb. And now, Jesus once again meets him at the shoreline where Peter is casting his nets. Jesus offers abundant nourishment and also a new command: "Feed my sheep." Then he turns to Peter and asks three times, "Do you love me?" It's as if Jesus says, "Here's my heart," which washes over Peter's three denials like a healing balm. No matter how far we wander, may we entrust our hearts to God. No matter if our faith is strong or weak, what we can give is our love."

When we measure strength, we often look at how much a person can lift. If we are not measuring physical strength but looking at mental strength it is often measured by how much stress a person can take. However, these measurements of strength are not Jesus' standards. Jesus' strength is found in his actions on the cross. Peter was a man of brute strength but through Christ he learned another way to deal with the difficulties he faced. As problems, trials, and expectations continue to pummel our lives sometimes drifting away seems like a good answer. The Chapel

I received some discouraging news about a friend's health and immediately lifted prayer for everyone involved. As I drifted through the day, I continued to cover them in prayer. In the kitchen. In the car. As the coffee machine in Get Go filled my cup. The prayers felt inadequate. The ache persisted.

Arriving at church to tend to some chores in late afternoon, I

went directly to the chapel. Our chapel. My chapel. The kids call it "the little prayer room." I dropped to my knees on the padded rail and tearfully shared it all. I emptied myself. And He took it all, the news of the day and all the other aches I had been collecting for days and weeks and months, and slowly began to fill me again. He poured hope and peace and strength into my deep.

I texted a friend as I left the room: "I always feel better after praying in there."

I like my time in the chapel. I visit for big prayers and for little prayers. I visit Sunday mornings before the church fills with life. Often, I stop to lift a "thank you" for church family and the love and light I have found here. I feel free as I step into the space. I cry. I rage. I rest.

Christian writer/speaker Rachel Held Evans, in her book "Searching for Sunday," recalls finding a quiet alcove in a monastery in Alabama.

"It's funny how, after all those years attending youth events with light shows and bands, after all the contemporary Christian music and contemporary Christian books, after all the updated technology and dynamic speakers and missional enterprises and relevant marketing strategies designed to make Christianity cool, all I wanted from the church ... was a quiet sanctuary and some

candles. All I wanted was a safe place to be. Like so many, I was in search of sanctuary."

If you're searching, I invite you to visit. The chapel sits behind the wooden doors in the rear corner of the sanctuary, stage left. The interior door is always unlocked (and it's my dream to unlock the exterior door so anyone could visit and pray).

To your left is a grand staircase that leads to the bell tower (the rest of the climb is considerably less grand.) To your right, there's a cross on the wall, a narrow altar and the padded prayer rail. There are six small pews and light pouring in through stained glass windows. On the altar sits the "Pulpit" bible, presented by the Rev. Charles Thorn to the Sewickley Methodist Episcopal Church in 1872 and used until 1909. You can flip through the pages and read all the things the Lord "saith."

The room is not quiet – you can hear the traffic rumbling along Thorn and Beaver streets, or Erik coaxing joy from the organ – but it feels insulated, safe, sheltering. It is a place to sit and breathe and think, or not think.

Spring is a good time to visit. The space is not heated, and in some seasons, the chapel is a storage shed, a maintenance depot. Someone has recently restored the space (Thank you!). The morning light is brilliant. The afternoon light is soft. I've also spent time there in darkness. There are overhead lights, but darkness insulates and shelters, too. I visit before Bible studies or committee meetings.

When, after 10 days, I learned that my ailing friend was rebounding wonderfully, I returned to the chapel. I didn't kneel. I flipped through the pulpit Bible, wondering how many people found peace and light in this space since 1872. I sat in the first pew, enjoying the light, sharing my gratitude with the one who provides. It was another long, unhurried conversation, flowing beyond my friend and his health.

I always feel better after praying in there. Please make arrangements with Pastor Hannah, Elizabeth or Ray if you'd like to visit the chapel outside of business hours.

But as I shared, I started to get a little anxious.
