#### FOR THOSE OVER 70½ — MAKING THE MOST OF YOUR IRA

A Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) is a direct transfer of funds from your IRA custodian, payable to a qualified charity. QCDs can be counted toward satisfying your required minimum distributions (RMDs) for the year, as long as certain rules are met. As any member over the age of 70½ knows, you are required to take an annual distribution from your IRA or face a stiff penalty. Since you have to take a distribution anyway, you can do it in the most tax advantaged way possible. For those who are not using their required IRA distributions for living expenses, you might consider making a QCD directly to the church.

In addition to the benefits of giving to charity, a QCD excludes the amount donated from taxable income, which is unlike regular withdrawals from an IRA. Keeping your taxable income lower may reduce the impact to certain tax credits and deductions, including Social Security and Medicare.

To make a contribution, instruct your IRA trustee or custodian to make a transfer from the IRA <u>directly</u> to Sewickley United Methodist Church. Many trustees and custodians already have forms and procedures in place to make this transfer.



#### Basics on IRA Qualified Charitable Distributions

- Data Qualified charitable distributions (QCDs) are allowed to be taken out of your traditional IRA without owing any federal income tax. In contrast, other traditional IRA distributions are taxable (wholly or partially depending on whether you've made any nondeductible contributions over the years).
- "Unlike garden-variety charitable donations, you can't claim itemized deductions for QCDs. That is okay, because the tax-free treatment of QCDs equates to a 100 percent deduction -- because you'll never be taxed on those amounts, and you don't have to worry about any of the tax-law restrictions that apply to itemized charitable write-offs.

You may place your donations in the basket outside of the church office. If you are unable to shop but wish to donate funds for the purchase of these items, mark your gift "UMCOR Kit."



As Sewickley Methodist Episcopal Church celebrated the 60th Anniversary of its incorporation and the 75th Anniversary of its organization on Sunday, November 17, 1912, they reflected on the recent history of the church. Here is a review of 1909 through 1912

In 1909 largely through the efforts of Doctor Bash, extensive improvements were made to the property; the auditorium was frescoed, seats re-varnished, electric lights put in, and a new pipe organ installed. Through the unceasing efforts of Doctor Bash a contribution of \$2000 was obtained from Andrew Carnegie, which was one half of the cost of the organ.

On April 28th at a meeting of the corporation the Trustees were authorized to place a mortgage not to exceed \$12,000 upon the church property, the proceeds of which were to be used in refunding the then present indebtedness and payment for the improvements and the pipe organ.

It should be mentioned that the leader of the choir resigned about this time and the choir kept up a good organization and furnished excellent music for two years, generously donating to the organ fund the \$600 which was the salary of the leader for that time. The Ladies Aid Society put in the new carpet.

When the organ was installed and the improvements made we had a week of celebration during which Bishop Vincent delighted us all with his addresses.

In 1910 in October Daniel L. Marsh, our present pastor, was appointed as pastor of our church. The success which has attended his pastorate is well known to all of us. Revival services were conducted for several weeks, resulting in many conversions and adding many members to the church.

In 1911 improvements were made in the main auditorium, panel work in front of the altar, and some changes made in the organ loft.

February 17th Dr. Robert McCready, for many years an official member of this church, died. Doctor McCready joined Sewickley church shortly after its incorporation, and was always solicitous for its success. His brother, D.A. McCready, was pastor for two years, 1848 and 1849.

On May 3rd of this year the pastor's salary was increased to \$2500 per year.

New rules for conducting the affairs of the church were adopted November 6th. The rules provided for the appointment of committees, each committee to be responsible for the particular work assigned to it. The Music Committee was authorized to secure three additional singers, thus forming a quartette, to lead the congregation in singing.

In 1912 Revival services, the second during the pastorate of our present pastor, were held, and a great many new members joined the church.

In the early months of this year the suggestion had been made that payment of the mortgage against the church be provided for, and in accordance with this it was arranged that on April 28th an effort be made to secure the necessary funds. The amount, including accrued interest, was \$9,720.50. This seemed a large sum to raise in one day, but when the day closed there was much rejoicing to find that over \$10,000 had been secured, not in subscriptions but mostly cash, the smaller part being interest-bearing notes, sufficient to pay the mortgage and also a floating debt and all bills due.


The current contributions, the basket collections, and the benevolences have all largely increased.

During the ten years just passed the member of this congregation have contributed for all purposes over \$100,000.

Since our semi-centennial, three names have been added to the long list of pastors who have had charge of our church. We have reason to be thankful, not only for the past, but also for the present prosperity of our church. The two years just passed, we might almost say were years of continuous revival, and the church is in a prosperous condition both spiritually and financially.

Of the present membership of this church but one belonged when the church was incorporated sixty years ago. Those who were members then together with many who have joined since, have been transferred to "the Church triumphant." They have gone from our midst. How we miss them. But the blessed influence of their lives remains with us, the remembrance of their words of counsel and encouragement is ours, and the anticipated glad reunion gives us joy.

The members of this church have been gathered from the various walks of life, and working together in the Master's vineyard, doing what their hands find to do, is it surprising that its influence is so broad, and that it touches the lives of so many people?



The Sewickley United Methodist Church will have the honor to present our Third Graders with their Bible during the worship services on **September 12**. The 2021/22 third graders are unknown to the Library Committee due to all of the changes and restrictions of the last 15 months. If your student is entering the third grade this coming school year, please contact the church office, Sandra Lane, or Warren Kinneer with their name. Parents are invited and encouraged to be there for the presentation.



Typically, each month, I come to you all sharing my thoughts on a specific theme, passage from the Bible, or stories from my everyday life. This month I come to you asking you to pray for our church administrative council. As a council, we have been tasked to represent our congregation and make tough decisions. During the June 2021 administrative council meeting, there was extensive conversation about how to fund the costs associated with several crucial building repairs while also paying down the Building of Faith Loan (from our 2014 sanctuary renovation).

The figures below are only rough estimates, however, they provide a broad overview of our current needs:

### Costs—Rough Estimates:

\$55,265- Building of Faith Loan Balance

\$33,000- Brick sealing, repairs to the windowsills in the Narthex

\$36,000- Parsonage Porch roof, etc.

\$20,000- Church Roof Repair

Total: \$144,265

\$34,000- Former PPP Funds

\$21,000- Brick Maintenance

\$7,800- Capital Fund (unallocated)

\$3,100- Theys Estate

Total: \$65,900

If you want to share some of God's love, if you want to celebrate His glorious imagination with a child, tuck some color into an Operation Christmas Child shoebox this year.

Tania, then 10, was living in Romania when she received her first OCC gifts. "When I opened my shoebox, I saw an explosion of color—plastic jewelry, a new hat, and scarves. My favorite items were school supplies. I received colorful pens, a notebook, and colored pencils," she said in testimony shared on the OCC website.



"As a child, I really loved going to school. I loved reading and writing. But school supplies were not readily available at that time. We only received a few pencils and they needed to last a long time. So, anything extra, or anything colorful, really meant a lot to me."

Olesia, then 5, had a similar experience when she opened her gifts at her home in Moldova. "I dumped my whole box on the floor so I could see everything at once ... The thing that stood out to me the most was a pack of colorful markers. I couldn't take my eyes off them. There were so many in the pack! I didn't know some of the colors existed. I was so excited, I jumped up and started running around the room. I always wished I could color and draw—the markers were exactly what I wanted."

Through the swirl of color, both Tania and Olesia began to see a portrait of Jesus.

"We were told that the shoeboxes were packed by other Christians," Tania said. "I learned that there are people who love Jesus Christ enough to give special gifts to children they haven't even met. I felt valued and loved, and this helped me to have a deeper walk with the Lord."

Olesia felt His embrace. "God used my shoebox to reassure me that He really loved me. It showed me that God does answer prayer. God became real and personal to me."

Sewickley United Methodist Church is launching its 11<sup>th</sup> OCC campaign, and together we have packed and shipped 1,001 shoe boxes. They have been distributed to children in South America, Central America, the Caribbean, Africa and Europe.

The months of July, August and September will be the most important to our 2021 Sewickley UMC Operation Christmas Child campaign. Through September, we will be collecting the following gift items:

- Health and personal care items such as toothbrushes, adhesive bandages, combs, hair brushes, hair accessories, socks and sunglasses
- School supplies such as rulers with metric measurements, markers, pens and colored pencils, pencil sharpeners and erasers, scissors and glue sticks
- "Wow" toys, including dolls, balls, stuffed animals, ball caps and jewelry

The Fellowship of the Cross has a donation box outside the church office.

Operation Christmas Child does not accept toothpaste, any liquids (including shampoo), candy, or war-related items such as toy guns or knives. There is an Operation Christmas Child option on the EasyTithe menu available through the church website. Financial contributions can also be made through the offering or church office; please mark them "OCC."

With every shoebox, children are invited into VBS-like programs that give them an opportunity to know the love of Jesus. They receive Bibles as they complete the program.

"The day I received my shoebox I went from knowing about Jesus to actually knowing Him," Olesia said in her testimony on the OCC website. "I began a personal relationship with Jesus—one where He is my Best Friend—instead of just a powerful Man I'd heard about during Sunday School."



#### **PUMPKIN PATCH 2021 UPDATE**

Diane and I have decided to keep our 20<sup>th</sup> celebration of the pumpkin patch small in order that we don't hurt our manpower at the Patch and overwhelm ourselves. We will let you know plans as soon as they become concrete, but one idea is to have a special project each Saturday in October, i.e. pumpkin painting, face painting, and maybe give out some cookies or something.
