Maybe hospitality is your gift and you'd like to greet people Perhaps you are more of a behind the scenes type of person. We have a booth with high walls that can conceal you as you run the slide show and/or care for the audio and visual needs.

Pumpkin Patch: It won't be long before we start asking for volunteers to help unload the truck of pumpkins, which this year will take place on September 30th. We also will be looking for those willing to engage with the community as you ring up the many pumpkins they will buy. Mark your calendars for a busy October!

In the midst of all of these activities will be opportunities to serve your neighbor, pray for each other, share the love of Jesus and witness to your faith. When we do these things, there is no doubt powerful and positive change will happen!

On August 13th there will be a community worship service followed by a picnic hosted by the congregations of



St. Matthews AME Zion, St. Paul's Lutheran, Sewickley United Methodist and Sewickley Presbyterian. It will be at 4 pm on the lawn of the Faith House located at the Sewickley Presbyterian Church. Folks from SUMC are asked to bring side dishes and desserts. Be sure to bring a lawn chair or blanket to sit on. During the service there will be a Back to School Blessing. All kids, youth and adults who attend school or volunteer or work in an education setting are welcome to bring a school related item with them to be blessed for the upcoming school year and receive a blessing themselves. This includes those on the home front as well. We've got your back! Whether you are connected to one of these congregations or not, the worship service and picnic are open to everyone.

Children's CH

Do you remember being small, and learning about our faith in church? This is passed from generation to generation, and we have a responsibility to share our faith so our children have a strong foundation to rely on through life.

Children's Church, during the 11am service, is

looking for 1-2 adult leaders and 1-2 assistants, each serving 1x a month. Training will be provided and you will be free to add your own special touches, the schedule runs September through May. Trading your week is easy if you can't make your scheduled week.

Each session, geared for children from age 4 through 5th grade, runs for about 45 minutes, until church lets out.

Children sit with their family in church until after Children's Moments, and then proceed to the upper room. Once there, they sit in a circle and share group activities, watch a Christian video or listen to a Christian story, telling stories from the Bible. Children who enjoy keeping busy as they watch are offered crafts.

Sometimes special service projects are created for church missions.

These are small group sessions so the children get to know each other and form bonds as they learn.

FOR THOSE 701/2 AND OLDER— MAKING THE MOST OF YOUR IRA


As those over the age of 70½ know, you are required to take an annual distribution from your IRA or face a stiff penalty. Since you have to take a distribution anyway, you can do it in the most tax advantaged way possible. Rather than using a portion of your required IRA distribution to give donations to the church, you might consider making a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) directly to the church. A QCD is a direct transfer of funds from your IRA custodian, payable to a qualified charity. QCDs can be counted toward satisfying your required minimum distributions (RMDs) for the year, as long as certain rules are met.

In addition to the benefits of giving to charity, a QCD excludes the amount donated from taxable income, which is unlike regular withdrawals from an IRA. Keeping your taxable income lower may reduce the impact to certain tax credits and deductions, including Social Security and Medicare.

To make a contribution, instruct your IRA trustee or custodian to make a transfer from the IRA <u>directly</u> to Sewickley United Methodist Church.



Let's pray for our children.


Let's pray for our youth.

SIMPLIFIED. ACCOUNTABLE STRUCTURE



A Simple Structure for Missional Effectiveness

At the Church Conference held on June 29, we voted to adopt the Simplified, Accountable Structure (SAS). There were 26 people present who were able to vote and 24 votes were received. We had 21 vote to adopt the SAS and 3 vote against it.

I am grateful to those who came to the meeting, asked some thoughtful questions and helped to discern the will of God for our church. I am also grateful to Donna Sawhill, Jenine Furry, Pam Honeychurch, Mark Benjamin, Jim Canfield and Laura Powell who served on the Communications team and have worked diligently to understand this model and helped to communicate it to others. Last, but certainly not least, I am grateful to Bill Utterback, Kristine Swaney, Rosemary Herring, Donna Sawhill, Warren Kinneer, Jim Hamilton and Wilma Hamilton who faithfully gathered monthly to pray us through this time of discernment.

What is next?

On August 19th there will be a workshop led by Kay Kotan for those who are serious about living into this model. Any who wish to know more and attend are welcome to do so. Please let me know at pastor@sewickleyumc.org so I can add you to our group.

The nominations committee will begin to meet to do the work that has now been entrusted to us to do. We will nominate the slate of leaders for the Leadership Board and they will be voted on at our Church Conference in the fall.

This new model will officially begin to be lived into on January 1, 2024. I am excited and feel some positive energy surrounding what lies ahead for us. I fully believe we have taken a step of faith and allowed God to guide us into something new. Though we don't yet fully understand it or know what will come from it, God does and our trust is in our God. God's word is a lamp to our feet and a light to our path and we will follow that light one intentional movement at a time.

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We're overwhelmed!

The Fellowship of the Cross hoped to inventory everything our SUMC family contributed during Christmas in July, and then report the totals in this publication. There was not enough time to get all the Operation Christmas Child contributions sorted and counted.

Your generosity was extraordinary. You knew our needs and responded wonderfully. Look for an update in future publications.

In the church basement, there is a mountain of T-shirts, and a mountain of notebooks. There are stacks of markers, crayons, pencils, pens and crayons. There are piles of glue sticks, pencil sharpeners, erasers and assorted school supplies.

There are socks, adhesive bandages, brushes and combs, toy cars, dolls and other "wow gifts," including a dancing cactus. We've never had a dancing cactus, but it is perfect. We also found empty shoeboxes and cash beneath the trees in the sanctuary, and both are welcomed.



FOTC will continue to collect gifts through September and financial contributions through early November. Prayer is always welcome. We will provide an updated list of our needs later this month.

We will schedule a packing party on a Sunday morning in late September or early

October. The Children's Church kids will be involved, but everyone is invited. The boxes will be blessed during worship services in November and delivered to children somewhere in the world during the Christmas season. The boxes are delivered along with opportunities to know Jesus.

This is our 13th OCC campaign, and we have provided more than 1,300 boxes in the past 12 years. Our boxes have been delivered to children in Ukraine, Africa, South America, Central America and Caribbean nations.

As always, the Fellowship of the Cross is grateful, encouraged and renewed by your faith in God and the ways he moves through Operation Christmas Child. We are thankful for your continuing support.

SAFETY MINISTRY NEWS

An evacuation at SUMC may occur due to a fire, an active shooter on site, or a natural disaster.

In the event of an immediate evacuation, on any Sunday, please follow the instructions of the Guardian on duty or follow your instincts and exit the building as quickly and safely as possible.

During worship service hours (9-noon), should evacuation be necessary, exit the church by walking (don't run) and gather in one of our 3 assembly locations to shelter in place until emergency personnel indicate it's safe to return:



- 1) The Pastor's Front Porch (home next door to playground, 333 Broad Street)
- St. Stephen's Church Door #12, adjacent to our parking lot. See picture to the right for the location.
- 3) AME Zion Church (corner of Walnut and Thorn Streets) any door will be open

When inside at SUMC, familiarize yourself with the nearest available exit doors and the above evacuation locations.

All children in the nursery and Sunday School classes will be evacuated at the guidance of their caregiver/ teacher.

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ANNUAL CONFERENCE WRAP-UP

The Western Pennsylvania Annual Conference of the United Methodist met June 15-17 at the Erie Bayfront Convention Center in Erie, PA to worship, celebrate and conduct the business of the annual conference. **Pressing on to Higher Ground**, based on Philippians 3:14, was the theme for the 2023 conference and was evident in the music, stage design, logo, and worship themes. The session included worship, ordination, Bible studies and plenary sessions, concluding on Saturday with a memorial service.

LEGISLATION

Members of the Annual Conference approved the <u>Consent Calendar</u>, with legislation focused on: accountable reimbursement and clergy allowances; nominations; special weekends; Conference evangelists; benefits for retired clergy; and more. <u>Read all legislation</u>.

A Connectional Budget for 2024 of \$4,752,662 was approved, reflecting a decrease of \$3,585,342 from the 2023 budget.

Notable Legislation

- RS 611 Prioritizing Ethnic/Racial Ministries: This legislation charges the Director of Connectional Ministries, Conference Treasurer, Coordinating Cabinet, and structures of the annual conference to mitigate the additional risks posed to Ethnic/Racial ministries during this present time of systemic change by prioritizing the funding and resourcing of Ethnic/Racial ministries within our conference. In addition to allocating financial resources, The Western PA Conference will prioritize providing support for the identified new and existing Ethnic/Racial ministries at the conference, district, and local church levels including spiritual and prayer support, advertising and promotion, administrative assistance, training for clergy and laity, and facilitating appropriate conference and general agency staff engagement.
- RS 309: Congregations To Pay Royalties When Using Negro Spirituals in Worship: Congregations are strongly encouraged to establish a Negro Spirituals Royalties Project by identifying and tracking all music used by the congregation that is considered to be a Negro Spiritual; offering the opportunity to collect a financial offering every time a Negro Spiritual is used in worship or other church gatherings; identify a partner organization to receive the offering, preferably one committed to teaching and developing African American musicians and/or performing artists, and to provide educational opportunities. Discussed on the floor, amended, and passed.

Legislation Pulled from the Consent Calendar:

- P5: To Proactively Care for laity, clergy, and churches remaining in The United Methodist Church following the completion of the Disaffiliation Process: Amended and ultimately referred to the IMAP Task Force for report back to Annual Conference 2024.
- RS 403, which aimed to establish the IMAP Household Alignment plan, was tabled until Annual Conference 2024. The
 reasoning for this action was to allow time and space for grief and healing. The IMAP task force was approved to continue its
 work.

DISAFFILIATION

The Western Pennsylvania Conference of the United Methodist Church ratified the disaffiliation agreements for 298 churches, 3 from the Pittsburgh District, during a special session in Erie, PA on June 14. Bishop Cynthia Moore-Koikoi presided. Voting on churches in blocks by districts, the body overwhelmingly affirmed all the disaffiliation agreements with no contestations. Churches must fulfill their settlement obligations in order to complete the disaffiliation process, which many did immediately following the session.

In an emotional show of gratitude after the completion of voting, Bishop Moore-Koikoi thanked the Board of Trustees for the difficult work they've done through this process. "This has been difficult work to do," she began. "It has been challenging spiritually, intellectually and emotionally. These persons before you were here for such a time as this. Because of their deep spirituality, their deep faith, because of their trust in God, they were able to carry out this painful process."

Bishop Moore-Koikoi urged everyone to leave the special session with a spirit of peace and to bless each other. "I am begging us to show the world who God is through the actions of those who are remaining in the conference and the actions of those who have disaffiliated," she said during remarks following the final vote. "Begging us to show the world who God is through how we will love each other and choose the better way."

FROM LAURA POWELL, YOUR CONGREGATIONAL LEADER

This month we will continue to explore John Wesley's seven ways to share faith and explore how we can practice these Wesleyan practices. The details of each practice can be found in *Wesley's 7 Ways to Share Faith*. Abingdon Press, 2015.



In Wesley's day, the Church of England didn't connect with the real lives of everyday people. Ironically, the ministry of Jesus was just the opposite. When Jesus spoke, "the

common people heard him gladly." Wesley longed to bridge the gap between real faith and real people. Although he was a highly educated Oxford fellow and deeply steeped in the Christian tradition, he refused to parade his scholarship. He chose to speak plain truth for plain people. He intentionally shaped his language so common people could gladly hear the gospel and respond.

Practice for SUMC: As disciples of Christ, when we witness to others, we simply speak our truth about our love for Jesus Christ directly from our heart. It will resonate with the person as the Holy Spirit is with you and the person. Sometimes, your words may seep into their heart slowly, giving them an opportunity to contemplate your words about Jesus. With others, it may feel like a bullseye opening their heart to God.

Practice 4: Use the Music of the Culture

Gregorian chants in Latin and heavy German music were standard fare in church services in Wesley's day. Although the words were meaningful, the music was a complete disconnect with the common people. It didn't speak their heart language. In his travels, Wesley found that pre-Christian people connected most easily with the gospel when it came through their native culture. He encouraged his brother Charles to put gospel words to the popular tunes of the day, and it caught people's hearts. Speaking in terms people could understand was part one of cracking the cultural code; music that touched the modern-day soul was part two.

Practice for SUMC: During our traditional service, we sing many hymns written by Charles Wesley. During the 17-18th century, pastors were not readily available to hold services. Charles Wesley purposely imbedded key Christian theology into his lyrics. Outside of church, they could sing the songs and be reminded of their Christian theology. Our contemporary service presents songs with Christian messages and contemporary music following Wesley's guidance to bring the music and message to the people in a contemporary way!

Select a Charles Wesley hymn, read the lyrics slowly and explore the imbedded theology. Select a contemporary Christian song and explore its message, symbolism, and scripture genesis.
