The Pastor's Peace

In last month's newsletter we talked a little bit about having bold(ish) faith. We took some time to put bold(ish) statements out there in existence about the things we believed God was going to do in our midst. Now we must face another reality; things might not happen the way we expect them to! This is another layer of faith. It does not just require faith to believe the promises of God will come to be amongst the believers of Sewickley UMC, but it requires faith to believe those promises might not look the way we expect or prayed for them to look. As we enter into the Advent season we are going to look at scripture after scripture that tells of the birth of Jesus Christ. What we come to understand rather quickly is that God works in some unexpected ways. For a long time the Israelites have faithfully been praying for a savior and God answered that prayer in Jesus Christ. Yet the way the Savior came into OUR existence was so unexpected that it was really hard for a lot of the Israelites to believe Jesus was indeed the One they (we) had been looking for. When some of them finally did believe, wonderful things happened in their life. Here is the really cool thing about the way God works — when something wonderful happens to an individual, we can be sure it is going to transform a part of the community around us. It is like a beautiful tapestry. It might all look like a big mess on one side while it's being put together, but pretty soon on the other side the picture begins to take form and make sense.

Expect the unexpected. God loves us so much the things God does in our midst are never siloed or singular. If it is the work of God among us, no matter how wild it might seem, then that activity, that blessing, that unexpected gift, will have an impact far greater than just ourselves. What unexpected thing has happened to you lately? What unexpected thing has happened to us as a church? Where do you think God is at work in them? When you figure that out, that is the place you are to give your much desired time and attention this Christmas season. Together let's weave the glory of God into the very fabric of our lives through our bold(ish) faith in God doing unexpected things among us for the greatest impact on the Kingdom of God.

In the angel's proclamation of the birth of Jesus, we hear the phrase, "ALL PEOPLE." The angels spoke to the most unexpecting group of shepherds and told them a message that was to "bring great joy to ALL PEOPLE." Yet still we sometimes wonder, "even them?" Does all really mean everyone, or does it simply mean a potential

for all if they would only believe in this message? Who would you be happy to leave out of the "all"? What unexpected beauty would you have missed, if they were already written out of the "all" without having the opportunity for the joy? Good news comes in unexpected

ways and to the most unexpected people.

Scripture Lessons: Ezekiel 37:9-14

Message: "Dude, Where's My Donkey?"

It was recently a shock to some of our systems when we learned there is not really a donkey in the Christmas story as told per scripture. Every manger you see, every movie that includes the birth of Jesus, every story you read outside of the Bible all have Mary riding to Bethlehem on a donkey. It is hard to think that there might not have actually been one there. Or, maybe there was. Either way it's an innocent thought. But sometimes the stories we hear that innocently fill in the blanks paint expectations in our hearts that make the truth hard to see. Was the inn keeper really mean? Was Mary really left to have Jesus all by herself? Did the world really usher in a King with such inhospitality? Maybe things didn't go as Mary or Joseph expected, but did they really go as bad as we were always taught to believe? Deconstructing our expectations has the possibility of minimizing the potential confusion and shock to our systems.

December 25, 2022 Christmas Day One Combined Service 9 am Scripture Lessons: Isaiah 9:1-7

Message: "Carry On"

Isaiah 9:2 says, "The people who walk in darkness will see a great light." One of the scariest things about the dark is that you simply cannot see everything. It is amazing the way a wandering hand, finding a light switch in the dark can have a great calming effect on a person. Just the hope of the light to come begins to bring about the peace. Then, when the light comes on, the knowing and the seeing allows the moment to unfreeze and carry on with what needs to be done. Time was standing still for the Israelites. It was like they were on a never-ending cycle of repeat all. Then a force finally propelled them forward into something new and time went on. That force is Jesus. Even though every year we tell the same stories and sing the same songs, immediately following the Christmas season is the New Year and life goes on. Happy Birthday to the light in the darkness, the hope for the future, the newness in each day of our lives!




CHRISTMAS COLLECTIONS FOR CHURCH UNION

The gift bags the VBS children assembled this summer were a big hit so we will be assembling more food bags for children who participate in learning programs at The Bridge/Hub (formerly Bethany House) in Northview Heights and blessing bags for the homeless who are served by the Daily Bread ministry on Pittsburgh's North Side. SUMC and community members are invited to donate shelf-stable snack items (ex: fruit & pudding cups, trail mix, granola bars, cheese & crackers, gum, etc.) and hygiene products (ex: travel-sized shampoo, soap, individually packaged toothbrushes, toothpaste, hand sanitizer, Band-Aids, tissues, combs, etc.) for use in these bags.

These two Church Union ministries also are seeking gifts of **NEW** child- and adult-sized hats, mittens, gloves, scarves and socks to help keep recipients warm this winter. Donations of food and toiletries may be placed in the bin in the hallway by the office. Clothing may be placed on the "mitten tree" in the sanctuary.

It's that time of the year when followers of Jesus begin to examine important decisions about charitable giving. The following information is designed to help you make the most of your year-end gift. Keep in mind the following... The adjusted gross income (AGI) limit for cash contributions to qualifying public

charities remains increased for individual donors. For cash contributions made in 2022, you can elect to deduct up to 100% of your AGI (formerly 60% prior to the CARES Act).

Cash Gifts

Gifts of cash are common and convenient and can be made in person, online, or by mail. Gifts of cash are generally made with currency, check, credit card, and even electronic funds transfers (EFT). For 2022 cash gifts must be completed by December 31. Remember to save all receipts and acknowledgements.

Non-cash Gifts

Non-cash gifts offer advantages too. Works of art, collectibles and other property can hold great value. Special IRS rules apply to these gift types. For example, for a non-cash gift greater than \$5,000, a donor needs to have an independent appraisal for tax purposes. Check with your advisor(s) for more information on arranging charitable gifts with non-cash assets.

Securities

Along with regular tax savings, you may be entitled to additional tax benefits when giving appreciated securities. Making gifts of highly appreciated securities allows you to avoid the capital gains tax that would be due if those assets were sold, offering tax savings even if using the standard deduction.

If you have owned the securities for more than one year, your gift is deductible and can be used to eliminate tax on up to 30% of your AGI in the year of the gift. Any unused deduction amount may be used to help reduce taxes in as many as five future tax years. If you are considering a gift of securities, allow enough time for your gift to be completed by December 31st.



Retirement Plans

You may not realize you have other assets that can be used to help you meet your charitable goals. Many individuals have funds in a qualified retirement plan such as an Individual Retirement Account (IRA), a 401(k) or a 403(b). These may be a good choice for making current

or future gifts, depending on your age and future needs.

For Those Age 72* and Older

(*The change in the RMD age requirement from $70\frac{1}{2}$ to 72 only applies to individuals who turn $70\frac{1}{2}$ on or after January 1, 2020. Please speak with your tax advisor regarding the impact of this change on future RMDs.)

If you have an IRA, you can transfer up to \$100,000 per year to qualified charitable interests; \$200,000 per year for a couple that each has an IRA. These charitable IRA transfers are not taxed and count towards the annual Required Minimum Distribution (RMD). Those who qualify should carefully consider the additional benefits of making all or a portion of their charitable gifts directly from an IRA. These tax-free gifts are particularly wise for those who may no longer itemize deductions for income tax purposes.

Other Gifts

Other gifts can be made from assets that may no longer be needed. For example, **Life Insurances Policies** that were taken out years ago for a specific purpose but are no longer needed today. If you have a policy like this, you may assign all rights and benefits of the policy to the Church.

You can also arrange a future gift by naming a charitable recipient as a beneficiary of a retirement plan. You and your family can enjoy use of the assets and charitable beneficiaries can receive any remaining funds in the future, free of income tax on amounts they receive.

The end of the year is the one of the most generous times of the year. Hopefully the information provided will assist you in meeting your giving goals.

The Finance Committee is excited to announce an important update to eGiving at Sewickley UMC as we transition from easyTithe to Vanco. Your generosity and financial partnership is how we are able to impact our community and beyond and we want to make sure everyone is aware of this great new change, which allows for simple, secure giving through a variety of ways, including mobile and online. Vanco provides an electronic option for making regular offerings. Contributions can be debited automatically from your checking or saving account, or processed using your credit or debit card. This new program offers convenience for you and, if you setup recurring giving, provides donation consistency for our church family.

To get started, visit sewickleyumc.org and the donate tab, or install the Vanco Mobile Faith app on your smartphone. The first time you visit, you will create your secure account. Then you can setup your recurring donation(s). To help cover the processing costs and fees, we encourage you to turn on the option to cover the processing fee. There will be a period of overlap with easyTithe and Vanco to give current e-givers time to make the transition.

I give thanks to God always for you. I write to you as I join my heart and voice with yours in celebration of the

final payment made on the renovation project of the grand and beautiful sanctuary.

The Bible tells us (in both the Old and New Testaments) that "your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, your old men shall dream dreams, your young men shall see visions." God says it through his prophet Joel (Joel 2:28) in a vision of those "last days" when Israel shall be forgiven and restored. We trusted God and on December 29, 2013, as part of our closing worship experience, we carried hymnals, Bibles, the cross, altar candles, etc. into the Simpson Room where we would worship for the next

4 months. We closed the door to the old sanctuary that last Sunday of 2013 and reopened it on Easter Day, April 20, 2014. We celebrated the resurrection of our Lord and Savior in the fully renovated sanctuary with our Bishop and District Superintendent in attendance. Bishop Bickerton consecrated God's dream and vison of the glorious sanctuary.

In faithfulness to God and God's ministry, everyone dug deep into their pockets and offered the sacrifice of praise through monetary pledges; gallons upon gallons of soup and hummus were made and sold to help pay off the debt.

I will watch with excited anticipation as to what God has in store for the body of Christ, known as the Sewickley United Methodist Church

Luke shares angels, shepherds, parents and child, but no buildings, doors, fences, or walls.



mentally, emotionally and spiritually.


Let's pray for those who feel trapped behind all the walls of prejudice that divide us.

DID YOU KNOW?

The Revised Common Lectionary is a lectionary of readings from the Bible for use in Protestant Christian worship, providing for the liturgical year with its pattern of observances of festivals and seasons. It was publicly released in 1994. It was preceded by the Common Lectionary, assembled in 1983, itself preceded by the

COCU Lectionary, published in 1974 by the Consultation on Church Union (COCU). This lectionary was derived from various Protestant lectionaries in current use, which, in turn, were based on the 1969 Ordo Lectionum Missae, a three-year lectionary produced by the Roman Catholic Church, following the reforms of the Second Vatican Council.

As in its predecessors, readings are prescribed for each Sunday: a passage typically from the Old Testament, or the Acts of the Apostles; a passage from one of the Psalms; another from either the Epistles or the Book of Revelation; and finally a passage from one of the four Gospels.

Also like its predecessors, it runs in three-year cycles; the gospel readings in the first year (Year A) are taken from the Gospel of Matthew, those in the second year (or Year B) from the Gospel of Mark, and in the third year (or Year C) come from

the Gospel of Luke. Portions of the Gospel of John are read throughout Eastertide, and are also used for other liturgical seasons, including Advent, Christmastide, and Lent where appropriate. With the start of Advent on November 27 we switched to Year A.

- Year A begins on the first Sunday of Advent in 2022, 2025, etc.
- Year B begins on the first Sunday of Advent in 2023, 2026, etc.
- Year C begins on the first Sunday of Advent in 2024, 2027, etc.

The Revised Common Lectionary is used in its original or an adapted form by churches around the world. Protestant denominations in the United States which use the Revised Common Lectionary include: American Baptist Churches, USA; Community of Christ; Disciples of Christ; Episcopal Church in the United States of America; Evangelical Lutheran Church in America; Moravian Church in America; Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod; Presbyterian Church USA; Reformed Church in America; United Church of Christ; United Methodist Church; and Unitarian Universalist Christian Fellowship. The Roman Catholic Church uses an adapted form of the RCL.


