From The Pastor's Heart

February is Black History Month, a time to reflect on issues of race and religion and celebrate the important roles African Americans have played in the development of the United States. Recognition of those roles from a historical perspective is an important step in celebrating the contributions of individuals and the collective changes the African American community has brought about.

"Black History Month is with us because, for a variety of reasons, black history has been ignored, revised or distorted too often in our history books. We find it difficult to explore honestly the reasons a study of black history makes so many of us uncomfortable," the late Rev. Gilbert Caldwell, who was active in the civil rights movement, wrote in a UM News Service commentary a few years ago.

"We know it is essential to be historically correct about the issues in England that energized the efforts that established the United States. We understand Israel exists in the main because of the history of the oppression of the Jewish people. However, there is difficulty for some people in admitting the existence of American slavery made necessary the abolition movement and the reality of racial segregation provoked and evoked the U.S. civil rights movement," he said.

If we do not remember accurately the negatives of the past, he said, we may repeat them. "Failure to remember the negatives deprives us of the opportunity to celebrate the magnificent progress we have made as a nation since slavery and legal racial segregation," he explained.

This list helps to simplify some very basic steps we can all take to aid in the fight against racism.

As long as we at Sewickley United Methodist Church continue to profess the good news of Jesus Christ, we will live out our faith by fighting against systems of oppression starting with our own hearts. We will not be on the side of history that repeats itself and continues to benefit from the dehumanization of our black brothers and sisters. And if we do in any way, may God forgive our sins, call them to light and allow us to do all in our power to make right the harm we were part of.



"Once in a lifetime a human being comes along who stands head and shoulders above the rest. Paul Robeson was such a man." "Father, Open our eyes to see ... we all bleed the same ... we're more beautiful when we come together."

The lyrics were written by Mandisa and shared wonderfully in song by Felicity, Genevieve and Grace during our contemporary worship on the eve of Martin Luther King Jr. Day in January.

"Father, Open our eyes to see ... "

I've heard many people pray and ask to experience

the world with the eyes and ears of Jesus. I offer a similar prayer every day.

"Let us see what you see, Lord. Let us hear what you hear. Let us respond as you would respond."

The intent almost always involves people who are suffering. Let us see the hungry, the lonely, the broken, the addicted, the discouraged, the disconnected ...

We use the same prayer to confront racism.

"Father, Open our eyes to see ... "

As we stand in the echo of Martin Luther King Jr. Day, on the doorstep of Black History Month, our Pastor Hannah is suggesting an addendum.

Lord, as you show us where we can share your love and your light to end racism, show us the beauty you see in the diversity of your children.

Let's make that our prayer for February. At about 5:45 pm, on February 6, as the sun is setting, from wherever you are, with whomever wants to join you, join us in lifting a prayer asking God to open our eyes to the beauty in people whose skin color and experiences are different from ours.

"We are one humanity ... but we are not the same, and that is a good thing," Hannah said in her January 16 message. "There is beauty to celebrate in our differences and that is an intentional part of the creation of God.

"It is a benefit ... to have new experiences that heighten our awareness, that help us be present in the moment and see the differences around us. Don't shove them out. Don't try to turn them off, but turn to see the differences and know they are good.

They are not (something) to be afraid of, not (something) to avoid or avert our eyes from. As long as we do that, racism will persist."

Hannah suggested embracing diversity through the arts, music and worship. Black History Month traditionally provides increased opportunities to explore and experience.

"As white folks, we cannot possibly drink from the same cup and experience first-hand the full evils of racism. We can engage in experiences that help us see the full beauty in our differences and to fight for them to be able to exist. I encourage you to engage in these experiences."

"Father, Open our eyes to see ..."

This was Hannah's prayer:

"Almighty God, we know you are good, you are generous, we know your blessings are meant for all to experience, so we fight for all to experience them. Lord, show us what to do. Show us how to move. Do not let us grow complacent. Do not let us be stagnant. Set us on fire with an awareness that the diversity among us is worth fighting for. In Jesus name we pray. Amen."

ANTI-RACISM STARTS FOR WHITE CHRISTIANS: DO'S AND DON'TS

CONNECT THE DOTS. Preach, teach, and say clearly in your church, "Violence towards People of Color is rooted in historical and institutional racism. This not just individual criminality or personal misconduct; it is systemic racial violence, and racism is a sin against God."

NAME THE RACISM YOU SEE. Don't ignore,

and behaviors. Call it out, and invite change.

Learn the history of racist terms and symbols

of white supremacy, including the Confederate

battle flag and Nazi and Ku Klux Klan insignia.





PARTICIPATE IN A STUDY OR DISCUSSION.

Learn what you don't know about racism. Listen to People of Color when they speak from their personal experience of racism.

DEVELOP A THICKER SKIN. Racism is a fact. Confronting and naming it requires you to learn its history and acknowledge its continuing presence in your church and community. Adjust to saying and hearing the word "racist". Instead of feeling defensive and guilty, choose to become an ally for change.



COUNTER WITH ACTS OF EQUITY AND JUSTICE, Contact your representatives, encouraging them to

support and enact laws that counter historic and current expressions of racism. Send a financial gift to a church or local organization actively working against racism in your community.

LOOK FOR SYSTEMIC RACISM, Redlining, sundown towns, voter suppression, and Jim Crow laws are clear expressions of institutional racism. As tempting as it is to say we are now past "those days," systemic racism, via implicit bias and explicit discriminatory practice, is very much present in our institutions, whether policing, healthcare, housing, education, governance, employment, financial, or religious. Choosing to be colorblind does not turn the world monochrome. And neither does ignoring racism magically make the world suddenly equitable and just for all.

CONFUSE "NOT RACIST" WITH ANTI-RACIST.

Anti-racism means one is actively confronting and seeking to dismantle racism in one's faith and daily life. Accepting the status guo and pretending race isn't a "thing" does not help to end racism. All Christians should embrace anti-racism as part of our walk with God.

MISS AN OPPORTUNITY TO TEACH.

Racism has such a hold on our society because white people are taught to ignore or dismiss it, and to believe "race" is something "they" have. Pastors and teachers in white congregations equip Christians to become anti-racist by naming historic, systemic, and even theological racism and seeking ways people of faith can confront and interrupt it.

SAY, "I DON'T SEE COLOR." Read the Pentecost story in Acts 2. All people of all nations, races, and tribes celebrated the coming of God's Holy Spirit. God made us all colors and intended we celebrate this diversity. The goal of anti-racism is for all of us to celebrate and "see color" as a gift from God, without ascribing greater or lesser value to God's people based on their skin color.

FAIL TO USE YOUR WHITE PRIVILEGE FOR GOOD.

Speak out when you see racism happening. Champion changes in your church, workplace, and civic groups that allow wider inclusion of BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, People of Color) folks. White people tend to respect and listen to other white people with greater openness and seriousness. Use that to foster anti-racism.

"OVERTALK" PEOPLE OF COLOR. Even in the work against racism, some white people are so used to being "experts" in the group they may unconsciously overtalk or dismiss the ideas and experiences of People of Color. Anti-racism work requires white people listen to and take the lead from People of Color.






TUESDAY MORNING WOMEN'S GROWTH GROUP

We just wrapped up the 2021 Budget Year, making this a good time to summarize the final figures from 2021 and to share what makes up our annual operating budget.

Our annual budget includes the receipt sources and expenses as outlined in the chart below. Each year the finance committee prepares a proposed budget using historical receipt data as a means of projecting receipts for the coming year along with the budget requests from each committee. Our goal is a balanced budget, meaning we don't want expenses to be higher than expected receipts. This task is not taken lightly. There are many large "fixed" expenses that, when balanced against our budgeted receipts, make up the bulk of our church budget. At the same time, we know that to do God's work and "Be the Church" we need to provide adequate funding to our various ministries. Once the finance committee approves the proposed budget, it is presented to the Administrative (Church) Council for discussion and approval.

The table at the top of this page shows the budget and actual expenses and receipts for 2021. When the 2021 budget was drafted,

we based the projected receipts on the 2020 receipts, which were significantly down due to COVID. You can see the 2021 budget was out of budget, with expected expenses nearly \$25,000 higher than expected receipts. Thankfully, 2021 didn't end the way the budget projected. Instead, we were blessed to finish the year with our receipts \$26,000 higher than our expenses. At our January Administrative Council meeting, we voted to take the \$26,000 overage and apply \$10,000 as a principal payment against our sanctuary loan (lowering the outstanding balance to \$35,197.46) and to put \$16,000 in the church's Capital Fund (used for repairs and improvements to our church building).

As your church treasurer, I want to thank you for faithful support of the ministries of Sewickley UMC! If you have any questions concerning the church finances please feel free to ask me. The Financial Committee meets the second Monday of every month and members of the church are welcome to attend as well.

SAVE THE DATES — ASBESTOS ABATEMENT PROJECT
