The Pastor's Peace

At this year's Annual Conference of the Western PA UMC, which was held in Erie, we had some hard work to do. You have heard about that hard work, so I won't take up more of your energy for that. However, there was a moment in the middle of our Friday session where life got real for a moment. A loud wail intruded on the conversation of legislation that was being discussed, followed by some commotion. It was difficult to not turn around and stare at the gathering of people to try and figure out what was going on. It definitely left you wondering if someone was mad about the current discussion or if someone had one of those other-worldly type of sneezes that you just don't understand how they exist. Neither was true.

After a little bit of time, someone went to the stage to inform the Bishop of a crisis that was taking place. A woman had fallen unconscious, and they had to call 911 to the scene. The Bishop stopped the meeting and asked for someone with the gift of healing to come to a mic and pray over the assembly and specifically over the woman. Pastor Michael Airgood got up and prayed and after he sat down the Bishop asked for some silence. I was amazed at how quiet a room of approximately 800 people could get. The paramedics came into the room, got her on a stretcher and took her to the hospital. We spent some more time in silence and then the Bishop asked for someone to play something lightly as we all spent more time in prayer.

The conference resumed and the Bishop received another word about this woman. The person who was sitting behind her said as soon as Pastor Airgood ended his prayer the woman woke from her state of unconsciousness. God is good and that is the church at work.

We will face a lot of division. We will face a lot of conflict. We will face a lot of things that take our attention away from the important work God is calling us to be a part of. But in that moment, we were able to set all of it aside and pour ourselves into the healing we believed could happen in the name of Jesus. In that moment, we set ourselves aside and put Jesus first.

Why do bad things happen? Why do things not go our way? Why do we have to fight and argue? Why can't we all just get along? I don't have an uncomplicated answer to that. I just know when Jesus is put first, good can and will come of it. When Jesus is put first, the church flourishes. When Jesus is sought out and his will is done, grand things happen.

Matthew 6:33 says, "Seek the Kingdom of God above all else, and live righteously, and he will give you everything you need." Seek after the things from above and not of this world. It is easy to get distracted; sometimes I am grateful for the opportunities that reorient our focus to that which really matters. By the way, the woman's name is Sue and she rejoined us at Annual Conference later in the day. She was okay!

Liturgist: Lynn Colosi Scripture Lesson: Romans 2:1-16 Message: "Fruit of the Spirit: Kindness"

I have a shirt that says "Be Kind." This seems to be a popular phrase that can be found on shirts, bumper stickers and hats. It seems like such a simple thing to do, yet it is not always our first go to behavior when interacting with others. Actually, when someone is kind it stands out and it makes our day. Kindness really can go a long way. The kindness that comes as a fruit of being connected to the Spirit of God can go even deeper, it can transform a life and completely redirect the path of an entire day, week or even year. It can be as simple as "be kind" especially when we are connected to the Spirit of God.

July 9, 2023 Sixth Sunday after Pentecost Liturgist: Carole Ford

Scripture Lesson: 2 Corinthians 9:6-15 Message: "Fruit of the Spirit: Generosity"

Do you want to be a magician? Have you always wanted to do a magic trick? Here is an idea, be generous. It is amazing to me the way you learn you have more than enough when you give more than you think you can. It is easy to give a little bit of what we have. It is easy to give our leftovers after we have been well taken care of and are stuffed. It is not as easy to give when it hurts, or to give before you receive. It is not as easy to give off the top instead of off the bottom. Generosity as a fruit of the Spirit never returns to us empty. When we are generous as an act of gratitude for God's generosity to us, we always find our resources multiplied. This is the only area in scripture that God says, "test me." Give generously and see the way in which the blessing is returned to you.

- variety of clear glass or plastic bottles in shapes that look like they could be found in a science lab


I struggled as I tried to conceive this month's prayer prompt.

As Independence Day approaches, I wanted to suggest a prayer for our nation.

I wanted us to pray into gun violence and domestic violence. I wanted us to pray into hunger and housing insecurity. I wanted us to pray into racism and immigration and acceptance. I wanted us to pray into anxiety, addiction and fear. I wanted us to pray for our leaders, our first responders, our teachers, our pastors, our parents of children and youth.

I wanted us to pray into an election season that, in its early days, promises to be hateful and hurtful.

For the first time, I launched an Internet search for help. How do we pray for our nation? What scripture can guide us through a time when our challenges seem so immense?



I found many suggestions, all of them sound. I found the most practical response, the most promising response, at the bottom of a column posted in 2019 at a site called Embracing.life. The author, Jenn Soehnlin, who describes herself as a mother of two, suggested 15 pieces of scripture to use in praying for our nation. These are the passages I found most encouraging:

Pray that our hearts would love generously and help those in need in our country. "Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility, value others above yourselves, not looking to your own interests, but each of you to the interests of others." Philippians 2:3-4

Pray that our hearts will let go of any anger or bitterness toward those with different ideas and show them love and respect. "Get rid of all bitterness, rage, and anger, brawling and slander, along with every form of malice. Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other just as in Christ God forgave you." Ephesians 4:31-32

Could we become a nation that values others and looks away from our own interests?

Could we become a nation that is kind and compassionate and forgiving?

On July 2, as the sunsets around 8:55pm, from wherever you are, with whomever wants to join you, let's pray together for God's Light in helping us transform into a nation that values every individual and meets every opportunity with kindness and compassion.

Lord, help us step away from our anger and bitterness and selfish ambition. Lord, help us to see each other, serve each other and value each other.

Lord, raise leaders among us who see value in all people and are committed to protecting and providing all of us.

Lord, help us to be leaders – in our church, in our neighborhoods, in our schools and workplaces, in our family and friend circles – who value all people and commit to protecting and providing and sharing your glorious Light. Amen.

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SIMPLIFIED, ACCOUNTABLE STRUCTURE



A Simple Structure for Missional Effectiveness

At the Church Conference held on June 29, we voted to adopt the Simplified, Accountable Structure. 26 church members were present who were able to vote and 24 votes were received. There were 21 votes to adopt the SAS and 3 votes against.

I am grateful to those who came to the meeting, asked some thoughtful questions and helped to discern the will of God for our church. I am also grateful to Donna Sawhill, Jenine Furry, Pam Honeychurch, Mark Benjamin, Jim Canfield and Laura Powell who served on the Communications Team and worked diligently to understand this model and helped to communicate it to others. Last, but certainly not least, I am grateful to Bill Utterback, Rosemary Herring, Kristine Swaney, Donna Sawhill, Warren Kinneer, Jim Hamilton and Wilma Hamilton who faithfully gathered monthly to pray us through this time of discernment.

What is next?

On August 19th there will be a workshop led by Kay Kotan, co-author of *Mission Possible: A Simple Structure for Missional Effectiveness*, for those who are serious about living into this model. Any who wish to know more and attend are welcome to do so. Please let me know at pastor@sewickleyumc.org so I can add you to our group.

The nominations committee will begin to meet to do the work that has now been entrusted to us to do. We will nominate the slate of leaders for the Leadership Board and they will be voted on at our Church Conference in the fall.

This new model will officially begin to be lived into on January 1, 2024. I am excited and feel some positive energy surrounding what lies ahead for us. I fully believe we have taken a step of faith and allowed God to guide us into something new. Though we don't yet fully understand it or know what will come from it, God does and our trust is in our God. God's word is a lamp to our feet and a light to our path and we will follow that light one intentional movement at a time.

FROM LAURA POWELL, YOUR CONGREGATIONAL LEADER

WHAT DOES WELSEY SAY?

As a priest in the Church of England, John Wesley was discouraged by the powerlessness of the church to reach British people. He felt something needed to change, so he abandoned his church's conventional ministry approaches and experimented with seven new practices. To everyone's surprise, spiritual revival broke out in England and beyond.

These seven practices can provide inspiration to SUMC. They can be used to improve our connections with the unchurched. Over the next several issues, I will introduce a summary of each practice and explore ways for us to practice these Wesleyan practices. The details of each practice can be found in *Wesley's 7 Ways to Share Faith. Abingdon Press, 2015.*

Practice 1: Be Devoted to Prayer

"Wesley rediscovered what the church of his day had forgotten: prayer releases the power of God. He called prayer "the grand means of drawing near to God" and found believing, persistent prayer to be the necessary first step to see God move. He modeled this conviction by devoting at least two hours a day to personal prayer and made fervent prayer a hallmark of the movement."

Practice: Can you increase your time on prayer? Each day add five minutes to your prayer time. Each day, your increased time will give you confidence to talk to God and get into the details. You will be able to expand your prayer scope. Then, you may sit in silence and be present with God.

Practice 2: Go Where the People Are

"When the love of Jesus Christ gripped Wesley's heart, he knew he couldn't keep it to himself. There had to be some way to reach the vast masses of people who would never darken a church door. Initially, Wesley was convinced the gospel could only be preached in the stained-glass setting of a church building. But with so few people attending church services, he was forced to consider other options. Reluctantly, Wesley began preaching in the open air. He would find a high spot on the edge of a city and speak to whomever would listen. Crowds of three, five, even ten thousand people would gather. Many of them were touched by the spirit of God and awakened to their spiritual state. A revival in England was born largely because Wesley was willing to take the gospel where the people were."

Practice: How can SUMC take the gospel to the streets? One example was our participation in the Pride parade. What can we do to emulate Wesley's preaching approach? What can each committee do to move their activities outside the church? As you experience your day, be intentional about bringing the gospel to people along your way.

Through our commitment to mission, hundreds of UMCOR hygiene and menstrual kits were assembled and distributed to people in need. Youth continued to grow as leaders at SPARK and served multiple communities by participating in Uth 4 Missions. Our apportioned giving also provided support and training for those who respond to God's call upon their lives by serving as lay servant ministers, ordained clergy, local pastors or missionaries.

What we do together as United Methodists is far more than any one congregation can do by itself. Your commitment through apportioned giving makes you a significant partner in the connectional ministries of the church that we all can celebrate. We are truly blessed.

I praise God for the faithfulness of His people. I thank God for the ministries we've supported and the disciples being made because of your faithful giving.

Did you know you can dial 911 for an emergency situation which may arise at the church?

The Safety and Security Ministry at SUMC recommends the following protocol in the event of an emergency on site at the church:

Dial 911 on your mobile phone. **DO NOT HANG UP until the dispatcher tells you to do so**. Information you will be asked to provide may include:

- Address of the emergency: our church address is 337 Broad Street, Sewickley, PA 15143
- Description of the emergency and required need for help

- Explain the current assistance that has been provided to the person(s) in need
- Specify the location within the building (reference the door numbers if possible)

Without putting yourself in harm's way, **in the case of an active shooter**, it will be helpful to provide the 911 dispatcher with this information:

- The location of shooter within the building (reference door numbers if possible)
- The number of shooters
- **Description of shooter**—physical features, clothing, race, gender
- Number and type of weapons held by shooter(s)
- Location and number of victim(s) or hostage(s) within the building

DO NOT HANG UP - EVERYTHING THE DISPATCHER CAN HEAR IN THE BACKGROUND COULD BE HELPFUL.

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We were visited by a Secret Santa in June, and we're hoping for a few more as we turn toward July.

On **July 16**, Sewickley UMC will celebrate Christmas in July during both worship services. We will have a tree in the sanctuary and share some Christmas music. The Fellowship of the Cross is encouraging our church family to bring some Operation Christmas Child gifts to place beneath the tree.

In the past two years, Christmas in July has become a key gathering point for our OCC campaigns.

In June, a friend of the SUMC family stopped by the church office with a dozen nylon backpacks filled with a variety of gifts. There was an additional shopping bag filled with gifts that didn't fit into the backpacks. We gratefully accept contributions throughout the year and

we're very thankful for the backpacks.

As we move through our 13th OCC campaign, we have been blessed with more than enough toothbrushes, sunglasses, rulers, scissors and stuffed animals to accommodate 100 boxes.

Christmas in July arrives at the same time as many vendors offer sale prices on back-to-school supplies. We need pens, pencils, colored pencils, pencil sharpeners, crayons, glue sticks and notebooks.

We also need wearables (T-shirts, socks, caps), personal grooming items (brushes, combs, adhesive bandages) and "wow" gifts such as dolls, balls, jewelry, hair accessories, and toy cars.

We also accept financial gifts to cover shipping costs. We will be gathering gifts and financial contributions through September and will schedule our annual packing party in late September or October.

FOTC donation boxes are located outside the church office, on a shelf beneath the bulletin board, and on the table in the Narthex by the main sanctuary entrance.

Since 2011, the SUMC family has contributed more than 1,300 boxes that have been presented, along with an opportunity to know Jesus and grow in His Light, to children in Ukraine, Africa, South America, Central America, and Caribbean nations.



Your generosity and financial partnership are how we are able to impact our community and beyond. Vanco is our eGiving portal and allows for simple, secure giving. It is available through our website, sewickleyumc.org, and through the Vanco Mobile Faith app.

Vanco provides an electronic option for making regular offerings. Contributions can be debited automatically from your checking or saving account, or processed using your credit or debit card. This giving option offers convenience for you and, if you setup recurring giving, provides donation consistency for our church family.

To get started, visit <u>sewickleyumc.org</u> and the <u>donate tab</u>, or install the Vanco Mobile Faith app on your smartphone. The first time you visit, you will create your secure account.

Then you can setup your recurring donation(s). We encourage you to turn on the option to cover the processing fee which will help offset the processing and transaction fees the church pays.

If you prefer to give the traditional way — by check or cash — please continue to do so!
