The Pastor's Peace

While working on the Blessing of the Animals service, I began watching videos of animals saving people and people saving animals. A couple of hours later I was still watching videos that included all kinds of amazing acts that are guaranteed to restore your faith in humanity! Sometimes it gets too easy to let all the negativity weigh us down and lose sight of the good in the world. But there is still much good in the world! We just must be willing to look for it.

Have you ever done one of those fun activity books called "Where's Waldo?" The book was originally printed in 1987. A fun fact about Waldo: He was an afterthought. Martin Hanford was known for his drawings of crowded scenes as can be found in the "Where's Waldo?" books. He was approached by David Bennet, a business associate and an art editor at Walker Books in England, about doing a children's book. They decided there needed to be a central theme in order to connect all the crowded scenes and keep people's attention, so they came up with the character originally named Wally. His name changed to Waldo when the book was published in North America. Wally gave people something to focus on from page to page and gained much popularity. If you have ever done one or two or three of those books (my brothers and I were big fans) then you know the more you do them the easier it becomes to spot Waldo. This is especially true if you go through the same book a couple of times!

Much like the "Where's Waldo?" scenes, the more you train your eye to see Jesus, the more you will actually see Jesus. Jesus is out there. He is on the busy streets of Pittsburgh, he is in the middle of the crowd of protestors, he is sitting in the seats at parliament. Jesus is riding on public transportation and walking through Walmart. Jesus is also lying on the beach and hiking in the mountains. Jesus is alive and is wherever you and I are. If you look for Jesus, you will see Jesus and never have to lose faith in humanity again.

Here is the challenge: This summer as you go on vacation, to the pool, grocery shopping or wherever you might be, I want you to take the picture of Jesus found on page 10 in this newsletter and I want you to take a selfie with Jesus. If you can't print Jesus out, we would be happy to do it for you in the office. Post that selfie to Facebook tagging Sewickley United Methodist Church in it or post it directly to our Facebook page. You can also post it to our Instagram account. Another option is to simply send the picture to my cell phone 412-294-7587 and I can post it for you. Include with the picture a couple of sentences of where you see Jesus.

Instead of making people search for Jesus, we are going to be a church that helps people find and see Jesus. Afterall, our faith isn't really in humanity, it is in our risen Savior, Jesus Christ, who works through us to spread love all over the world!

On their way to children's church in late April, some Sewickley UMC kids carried armfuls of stuffed animals, contributed by members of our church family, to our Operation Christmas Child room. They were surprised to see all that has been contributed toward our 2022 campaign.

"People are giving already?" they asked.

A few moments later, after hearing the story of Jesus on the road to Emmaus (Luke 24), the children were asked how they were reminded that Jesus was always near. They talked about the sun and stars and flowers, and moms.

"Nature," said one child.

"The whole world." said another.

"My stuffed animals," said one of the girls.

One of the boys was skeptical about the stuffed animals, but the girl expanded on her response.

"When I snuggle with my stuffed animals, I think about my mom and dad and all the people who love me, and I remember that Jesus loves me."

The skeptical boy nodded and said, "I get it now."

This is why the Fellowship of the Cross has launched our 12th Operation Christmas Child campaign: children feeling loved, children feeling Jesus, children sharing Jesus, children seeing Jesus in new ways.



We include "something to love," a stuffed animal or a doll, in every box.

The Sewickley UMC family has filled more than 1,100 shoeboxes in the past 11 years. We have packed 100 or more boxes in each of the past 10 years. Our boxes have

reached children in the Dominican Republic, Honduras, Ecuador, Columbia, the Bahamas and multiple nations in Africa. Twice, our boxes have reached children in Ukraine.

June, July and August are our most important collection months. We will invite church family into a packing event in September.

FOTC is accepting donations such as toothbrushes, combs and brushes, school supplies, small toys and stuffed animals, jewelry, socks and t-shirts, ball caps and empty shoeboxes. We can accept very "gently-used" gifts. We cannot accept toothpaste, bar soap, liquids of any kind, candy or war-themed gifts.

A collection box for OCC sits outside the church office, and we can accept financial gifts through church giving windows throughout the year.

FOTC is immensely thankful for those who contributed to OCC in recent months. Your gifts have provided an encouraging foundation for our 2022 campaign.

On behalf of the residents of the Union Aid Building at 511 Centennial Avenue, THANK YOU to the Fellowship of the Cross, their leaders, and all church family youth for planting flowers in our gardens and containers on Sunday, May 22nd. Robin Craig Clark wrote, "All the flowers of all the tomorrows are in the seeds of today." As the flowers bloom and flourish, they feed our souls with their quiet beauty and we enjoy their abundance of color and fragrance from spring - to summer - to early fall!

UMCOR UKRAINE DONATIONS AT WORK

Foundation partners with United Methodist Church to donate medical supplies to Ukraine

Months into the brutal war in Ukraine, hospitals in the besieged areas of the country are overcoming incredible obstacles to treat patients who need them now more than ever.

With thousands of people injured, there's been a dire need for medical supplies and non-profit organizations like the North Zulch, Texas-based Arlene Campbell Humanitarian Foundation.

"I see resilience," said Lena Denman, president of the foundation. "I see a [Ukrainian] people who have great fortitude, who have a willingness to fight and win."

The foundation is partnering with the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR), part of United Methodist Global Ministries -- the worldwide mission, relief and development agency of The United Methodist Church.

"The goal of UMCOR is to alleviate human suffering," said UMCOR's chief executive, Roland Fernandes.

The power of the global ministry plus its small donors has added up to one of the biggest donations of medical supplies from a nonprofit organization during the war. Despite the logistical nightmare, the organizations say they have delivered 24 tons of supplies worth nearly \$1 million.

"We're working with specific doctors, specific requests, and we're meeting those requests so that we see where the aid goes," said Denman.

Since Russia's invasion, Denman's foundation and UMCOR have sent three massive shipments of supplies like gowns, gloves, surgical kits and mask respirators. The third truckload arrived in May to the Ukrainian Health Ministry Heart Institute in the capital, Kyiv.

"I think really being able to get the supplies on the ground is something that we don't often do," Fernandes said. "So to see that happen was a sense of...hopefully this really helps people who really need this."

The relief has helped.

One grateful recipient is Dr. Vitaly Demyanchuk. The cardiothoracic surgeon at the Ukrainian Health Ministry Heart Institute has been living in the hospital treating victims of the war.

Demyanchuk told ABC News "that despite the hard times, we're trying day by day to return to work at full capacity. We are dedicated to providing care for patients."

The doctor has also distributed some of the donated supplies to other medical facilities including a children's hospital where Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy recently visited and honored doctors. They have been taking care of orphans who escaped the bombarded city of Mariupol. Demyanchuk said the U.S. aid "plays an enormous role in helping us do our job and do it as effectively as we can."

Denman said she fell in love with the Ukrainian people and culture more than 20 years ago. In 2000, she traveled there with Arlene Campbell, who started a non-profit organization to ship containers of food, medical equipment, medicine, and supplies to the former Soviet states. Campbell also developed a studentteacher exchange program with the help of a grant from the U.S. State Department.

In 2016, Denman started the Arlene Campbell Humanitarian Foundation near College Station, Texas with a mission to honor her late mentor and continue sending medical supplies and equipment to that region.

Now with a new conflict after Russia's recent invasion, Denman is stepping up efforts to help.

"The need is outstanding. The need has only increased," said Denman. "The UN sent out a flash appeal asking governments and NGOs to only increase the aid not to decrease it at all."

While the need grows larger by the day, the United Methodist Church and the Arlene Campbell Humanitarian Foundation say so does their support for the people of Ukraine.

"Arlene was a widow and she had no children," said Denman. "Her legacy is me carrying on her foundational work to help Ukrainians and I know that she would be so pleased if she was alive today to see it in existence and to see the relationship we've built with UMCOR."

WESTERN PA ANNUAL CONFERENCE, JUNE 2 - 4

When you hear the term "annual conference," it could be referring to any one of three things. The annual conference is a regional body, an organizational unit AND a yearly meeting.

Regional body

The annual (sometimes referred to as 'regional') conference is described by the church's Constitution and (other parts of the) Book of Discipline as the "basic unit" of the church.

In the United States, an annual conference may cover an entire state, only part of the state, or even parts of two or more states. There are also three missionary conferences in the United States, which rely upon the denomination as a whole for funding.

The United States has 54 annual conferences, supervised by 46 bishops. There are 75 annual conferences in Africa, Europe, and the Philippines, which are supervised by 20 bishops.

Organizational body

In the U.S., the annual conference has a central office and professional staff that coordinate and conduct ministry and the business of the conference. It likely has a director of connectional ministries, treasurer, directors of program areas (such as camping), communications director, and other staff as deemed appropriate for the annual conference and as required by the Book of Discipline. Clergy and laypersons may also serve on conference boards, commissions and committees.



Annual Conference sessions

Each typical year an equal number of clergy members and lay members attend their conference's Annual Conference session for worship, fellowship, and to conduct the business of the conference, which may last 3-5 days. During these sessions, members of the conference hear reports of past and ongoing work; adopt future goals, programs and budgets; ordain clergy members as deacons and elders; and elect delegates to Jurisdictional and General Conferences (every 4 years). The bishop presides over these meetings.

Sewickley United Methodist Church is part of the Northeastern Jurisdiction, which includes all of the UMCs of Connecticut, District of Columbia, Delaware, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont and West Virginia. Within the Jurisdiction, we are part of The Western

Pennsylvania Conference, which is made up of nearly 800 local churches in 23 western Pennsylvania counties. The Western Pennsylvania Conference is further broken down into 10 districts, Sewickley UMC being part of the Pittsburgh District.

This year's Annual Conference of the Western Pennsylvania Conference is taking place June 2 & 4 in Erie. We will be represented by Pastor Hannah and our Lay Member to Annual Conference, Donna Sawhill. Lay Equalization Members from our congregation are Martha Boward and Wilma Hamilton. Lay Equalization members help balance out the number of laity with clergy. Rev. Jim Hamilton, a retired elder, will also be there.
