The Pastor's Peace

This is the time of year when we start planning for and praying over the Western PA Annual Conference. This year we will gather in Erie on June 14th through the 17th. I am asking you to join me in prayer now more than ever for this meeting of the Annual Conference. On Wednesday June 14th we will have a Special Session to vote on the churches that are choosing to disaffiliate from the United Methodist Church. This means they will no longer be governed by the polity of the United Methodist Church as found in the Book of Discipline. They will no longer be labeled as or identify as a United Methodist congregation. Some will choose to join the Global Methodist Church, some will go non-denominational, and some are still figuring out where God is calling them to next. Each of these churches met with their District Superintendent and held a special Church Conference where the members of the congregation voted to stay or to leave the UMC. As of now, out of 766 churches that make up the Western PA Annual Conference approximately 300 churches have voted to disaffiliate. Some churches have voted to close instead of disaffiliating. There are a few things I want you to be aware of.

- 1. God is still in control. The church is still the body of Christ. The UMC might be splitting but the Body of Christ will remain until one day when Christ comes again and tells us differently. We will still be in connection with our siblings in Christ no matter what denomination they identify as.
- With that said, the UMC will look different. As churches leave, the reality is finances leave our conference. The conference staff
 will change, and our districts will reorganize. Pray for our conference leaders as they faithfully decide how to be good stewards of
 the people and of the resources that remain in our Annual Conference.
- 3. Not every church took a vote to disaffiliate. This vote was not a requirement. Only those churches who were considering the possibility of disaffiliating took a vote. We held a meeting last year to talk about what was happening in the UMC and I did not gauge nor hear any feedback that there was interest in the possibility of disaffiliating.
- 4. If you have any questions, comments, or concerns that you would like to discuss regarding what is happening, please do not hesitate to reach out to me. Laura Powell, our Congregational Leader, is also available to answer any questions you might have.

Please continue to faithfully be in prayer as the time draws near to gather one last time with so many who have long been our United Methodist kin. This is a sad time in our life together. Many are speaking harsh words to others out of a grief that has not made us the best we can be. Many who are choosing to stay United Methodist will say goodbye to churches they were raised in or have committed their time and resources to for a season of their life. Many of these folks will find themselves looking for a new church home. Please be in prayer for all who are affected by this time in our life together.

I cannot leave you with this word of sorrow. Regardless of what we face, with Christ there is always hope. 1 Peter 2:10 reminds us, "Once you had no identity as a people; now you are God's people. Once you received no mercy; now you have received God's mercy." We (all who belong to the UMC and all who do not) ultimately belong to God. Our life is in God's hands and there is no better place for them to be.

Sophia Geason will graduate from Quaker Valley High School on June 2. She plans to take a gap year and perform in community theatre.





Your generosity and financial partnership are how we are able to impact our community and beyond. Vanco is our eGiving portal and allows for simple, secure giving. It is available through our website, sewickleyumc.org, and through the Vanco Mobile Faith app.

Vanco provides an electronic option for making regular offerings. Contributions can be debited automatically from your checking or saving account, or processed using your credit or debit card. This giving option offers convenience for you and, if you setup recurring giving, provides donation consistency for our church family.

To get started, visit sewickleyumc.org and the donate tab, or install the Vanco Mobile Faith app on your smartphone. The first time you visit, you will create your secure account.

Then you can setup your recurring donation(s). We encourage you to turn on the option to cover the processing fee which will help offset the processing and transaction fees the church pays.

WESTERN PA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

When you hear the term "annual conference," it could be referring to any one of three things. The annual conference is a regional body, an organizational unit AND a yearly meeting.

Regional body

The annual (sometimes referred to as 'regional') conference is described by the church's Constitution and (other parts of the) Book of Discipline as the "basic unit" of the church.

In the United States, an annual conference may cover an entire state, only part of the state, or even parts of two or more states. There are also three missionary conferences in the United States, which rely upon the denomination as a whole for funding.

The United States has 54 annual conferences, supervised by 46 bishops. There are 75 annual conferences in Africa, Europe, and the Philippines, which are supervised by 20 bishops.

Organizational body

In the U.S., the annual conference has a central office and professional staff that coordinate and conduct ministry and the business of the conference. It likely has a director of connectional ministries, treasurer, directors of program areas (such as camping), communications director, and other staff as deemed appropriate for the annual conference

and as required by the Book of Discipline. Clergy and laypersons may also serve on conference boards, commissions and committees.



Annual Conference sessions

Each typical year an equal number of clergy members and lay members attend their conference's Annual Conference session for worship, fellowship, and to conduct the business of the conference, which may last 3-5 days. During these sessions, members of the conference hear reports of past and ongoing work; adopt future goals, programs and budgets; ordain clergy members as deacons and elders; and elect delegates to Jurisdictional and General Conferences (every 4 years). The bishop presides over these meetings.

Sewickley United Methodist Church is part of the Northeastern Jurisdiction, which includes all of the UMCs of Connecticut, District of Columbia, Delaware, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont and West Virginia. Within the Jurisdiction, we are part of The Western Pennsylvania Conference, which is made up of nearly 800 local churches in 23 western Pennsylvania counties. The Western Pennsylvania Conference is further broken down into 10 districts, Sewickley UMC being part of the Pittsburgh District.

This year's Annual Conference of the Western Pennsylvania Conference is taking place June 15—17 with a Special Called Session on June 14th. During this Wednesday session we will be voting on the churches who have already voted to disaffiliate. We will be represented by Pastor Hannah and our Lay Member to Annual Conference, Mitch Hortert. Lay Equalization Members from our congregation are Martha Boward and Wilma Hamilton. Lay Equalization Members help balance out the number of laity with clergy. Rev. Jim Hamilton, a retired elder, and Pastor Laura Powell, a Local Licensed Pastor serving in extension ministry as a Chaplain, will also be there. Please be in prayer for our Annual Conference and all those attending.

STEWARDSHIP: AN UPDATE

As previously mentioned, SUMC is in the early stage of planning a stewardship initiative with a focus on:

- Creating a capital fund adequate to the needs of the very visible, beautiful and complicated building with which we have been entrusted. Currently there are a few areas needing significant attention, in some cases requiring large expenditures within the next year; others will be addressed on a planned basis over the next several years. A few examples include:
 - Boiler and related plumbing, with leaks and malfunctions being both costly and the possibility of serious leaks and or ruptures being a threat to our building and facility integrity
 - The roof is a constant irritant and in need of ongoing repair and will require replacement sometime within a few years
 - Gutter and downspout repair or replacement
 - Concrete work
 - Ongoing maintenance, including but not limited to, brick work, windows and doors, clock tower and bell, painting, and flooring

A detailed plan addressing the long-range needs of our building, as well as financial goals, will be forthcoming as it is developed.

Please note that the Church Council approved a budget which includes the separate identification of Capital Contributions, which we hope are beyond contributions pledged or planned for general operating expenses; several of our congregation have already made these earmarked contributions.

- 2. The Operating Budget is facing inflationary pressures, especially related to rapidly rising utility costs as well as rising building insurance costs and, of course, general inflation will increase our base operating costs by approximately 10% for 2023. Since the February newsletter, which provided a brief overview of the budget needs, we have been blessed with an uptick in general contributions, however we are still running behind our goals for the year, but we should be able to recover if a few more of us increase our giving as able. See page 11 for a financial summary.
- 3. Increasing our service to our members and broader community, including adding programs and depth for children and youth, will be critical to retaining and growing our church and will require allocating additional human and spiritual resources; currently there are no specific programs or initiatives in place, however it is reasonable to presume added financial resources will be very helpful in reaching many in our community who have no church home as well as to better meet the needs of our growing children's program.
- 4. Planned giving, including remembering SUMC in your wills and estate planning, will be addressed later this year or early next, however if anyone would like help in this area in the near term, please let Pastor Hannah, Pam Honeychurch (church treasurer) or me know and we will be glad to introduce you to someone who can help immediately.




SAFETY AND SECURITY SNIPPETS

As we step into June, we find 38 shoeboxes wrapped in bright Christmas paper sitting on a table in one of our basement classrooms.

Operation Christmas Child is accelerating at Sewickley UMC.

Kara W. and daughters Elliett and Evarett, as they have for so many years, wrapped and delivered the shoeboxes. We're thankful for their continuing support, and we're thankful for the

reminder that a successful OCC campaign requires energy and imagination from spring through summer into fall.

The Fellowship of the Cross, leading our OCC drive for the 13th year, has also received enough sunglasses, toothbrushes, scissors, rulers and stuffed animals to accommodate 100 shoeboxes.

Our needs include school supplies (pens, pencils, crayons, notebooks and glue sticks), wearables (T-shirts, socks, caps), personal grooming items (brushes, combs, adhesive bandages) and "wow" gifts such as dolls, balls, jewelry, hair accessories, and toy cars. The FOTC donation box is located outside the church office, on a shelf beneath the bulletin board.

Since 2011, the SUMC family has contributed more than 1,300 boxes that have been presented, along with an opportunity to know Jesus and grow in His Light, to children in Ukraine, Africa, South America, Central America and Caribbean nations.

THE SALE HAS ENDED—THE SOUP POT IS EMPTY

In 2016, the Soup & Hummus sale was started by Donna Sawhill, Sandy Kuriger, Sandra Lane and myself, with the goal of raising funds to help pay down the sanctuary renovation loan. When we met to plan the 2022-23 year, we decided to make this, our 7th year, our last. We envisioned the loan being paid off (it was!!) and felt we accomplished what we set out to do.

Our sale was successful thanks to the many soup and hummus lovers who faithfully supported the sale and thanks to the dedication of the soup and hummus team, which also included Bola Nicholson, Belinda Resler, Jeff Moore, Rhonda Coles, Nancy Shuluga, Bill Kuriger, Jr., Pat Grossarth, Jenine Furry, and Susie Moffett, all of whom stepped in to make soup, helping to give Donna, Sandy and me an occasional and much appreciated month off from soup making.

By the time the sale was over, \$27,276.52 was raised and applied to the loan principal, with an additional \$4,603.51 from the sale going into the Capital Fund to help care for our church building. The total raised throughout the 7 years was \$31,880.03. For the most part, the ingredients for the soups and hummus were covered by the "chefs," which further helped maximize the funds raised through the sale.

Over the seven years, 2,721 quarts and 544 pints of soup, and 654 containers of hummus were ordered. These counts don't include the uncounted extras that were sold. Often, extra soup was given to people going through challenging times as well.

We also didn't shy away from trying different soups, and in total offered 33 different varieties: Beef Barley Vegetable, Black Bean, Broccoli Cheddar, Butternut Squash, Chicken & Wild Rice, Chicken Tortilla, Chicken Gnocchi, Creamy Chicken Noodle, Chili, Corn Chowder, Corned Beef & Cabbage, Cream of Potato, French Onion, Gazpacho, Hearty Bean & Barley, Ham & Bean, Ham & Potato, Lentil, Minestrone, Mushroom Bisque, French Onion, Pasta e Fagioli, Peanut, Sweet Sausage & Tortellini, Southwestern Bean, Stuffed Pepper, Tomato, Tomato Dill, Vegetable Beef, Vegetable Cheddar Chowder, Vegetarian Vegetable, Wedding, and Zuppa Toscana.

We didn't let the pandemic stop us! Early in the pandemic when there were shortages of food items, it became challenging to find the ingredients we needed, but we persevered. When we couldn't meet in person for worship and luncheons for people to have access to order forms, we moved to phone calls and online ordering, which continued until the sale ended.

The sale taught me that a small idea can make a big difference. All of us, soup & hummus makers and soup & hummus lovers, came together in a beautiful and yummy way and made a huge impact! Thank you!!
