The Pastor's Peace

"In Luke 22 so much takes place before Jesus heads to the cross. He knows the cross is coming and he knows it is going to be painful. He also knows that the pain is going to be worth the outcome in the end. So vividly was his understanding of what he was going to face that verse 44 says, "He prayed more fervently, and he was in such agony of spirit that his sweat fell to the ground like great drops of blood." All the while, those who followed him, who swore to give their lives for him, who worshiped him, slept. Being on this side of the resurrection we can praise the Lord that Jesus did hard things for you and me.

I would like to report to you that the Leadership Board is working on some very exciting and culture changing, church transforming administrative things at this moment, but we are not. What we are working on is filling the holes in our administration so we can free up the energy to do the sexy things. We are putting together a financial policy, making a Strategic Plan for our building and maintenance needs, finishing up an Employee Handbook. Sometimes we must do things we don't want to do so that we can do the things we want to do.

We want to work on increasing congregational giving by 20%. We want to make intentional connections with our African American siblings and the Hispanic community. We want to become a vital ally in the LGBTQIA+ community starting with the Quaker Valley School district. We want to support the youth program as they get up and running. We want to expand the music ministries of the church. That is a lot of wants but those are our God-Sized goals. There is no small thinking here. As the Leadership Board our job is to do the unsatisfying work (i.e., policy creation, in my opinion) so that those in leadership positions within our church's ministry have the energy, the resources, and the support to do the things God is calling us to do. We find the resources needed to do fun things.

None of the work that God is calling us to is going to require us to sweat blood, but it might not always be glamorous. We do it because we are so thankful for what Jesus has done for us. We do it because we want others to know this love of Jesus that held him to the cross, that sent him to the grave, that rose him to life once again. That is at least one hard thing we won't have to do. Jesus has defeated sin and death for you and me. Now we respond by doing all we can to share this good news with others.

What hard thing have you been putting off lately? What are you not doing that you know Jesus is nudging you to do because it doesn't seem all that interesting? In a time of just about every modern convenience we can think of and every form of constant entertainment we dream up the temptation to do the easy things is real. However, the easy things are not usually the most rewarding things. Jesus didn't promise it would be easy but if we follow the will of God, it will be easier. This is true no matter how unpleasant it may seem right now. Amen!


WORLD DAY OF PRAYER

Everyone is welcome to attend the 95th Annual World Day of Prayer Observance in Sewickley which will be held in our church on Friday, March 1st at 11am. A luncheon will follow at noon.

World Day of Prayer is a worldwide, ecumenical movement of Christian women of many traditions who come together to observe a common day of prayer on the first Friday in March each year. Women in more than 170 countries and regions participate in this movement. Through World Day of Prayer, women affirm that prayer and action are inseparable and have immeasurable influence in the world. The motto of World Day of Prayer is,

"Informed Prayer and Prayerful Action."

UMCOR SUNDAY



On March 10th we will celebrate UMCOR Sunday. The United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) provides relief, response and long-term recovery grants to communities and individuals whose lives have been upset by war, storms or other crises. Last year, UMCOR delivered \$1.7 million toward:

• International Disaster Response including relief for those impacted by the conflicts in Israel, Gaza, Ukraine and Sudan; earthquakes in Morocco and Turkey, floods in Haiti and Africa, and cyclones in Asia and Africa

- U.S. Disaster Response including relief after Hurricane Idalia, the Maui wildfires, tornadoes in the Mid-South and Oklahoma, and California floods and landslides.
- Global Migration including food aid, basic necessities, and legal and transportation services for vulnerable migrants and refugees.
- Relief Supplies including the collection and storage of cleaning kits, hygiene kits and menstrual hygiene kits so that they can be distributed whenever the need arises.

Scripture Lesson: Psalm 19

Message: Wandering Heart: "Praise the Mount"

Praise the mount of God's unchanging love. . . " This lyric represents Peter's mountaintop faith moment. It speaks to spiritual euphoria and feeling the closeness of God. In this story, Peter proclaims who Jesus is. He speaks with conviction. Peter claims his faith. If you had to speak your faith in one sentence or phrase, what would you say? When we have the courage to say, "This, I believe..." then that conviction has a ripple effect on others. When life gets rocky, we lean on mountaintop moments and our deepest convictions to see us through.

March 10, 2024 Fourth Sunday in Lent

Liturgist: Martha Boward Clocktower Ringers, 11am Service Scripture Lesson: Psalm 107:1-3, 17-22

Message: Wandering Heart: "I'm Fixed Upon It"

When your world unravels and your beliefs are tested, you may cling to what you know. As Jesus foretells his death and resurrection, Peter protests. Peter is fixed upon the way he thinks things should go; he resists the pain of what will come. But Jesus is fixed upon his calling and calls Peter out. For everyone, there comes a time when your faith is tested and you will have to face difficult and inconvenient truths. We may want to take the easier path, the path with less pain. We may want to cling to easy or simplistic answers. Instead, what does it look like to welcome complexity? Can you stay fixed upon your convictions while also expanding your perspective?

Fifth Sunday in Lent
Liturgist: Lynn Colosi
Scripture Lesson: Psalm 119:9-16

Message: Wandering Heart: "Teach Me"

Peter is often all or nothing—either resisting Jesus or drawing closer to him in earnest. In this scripture, we see a version of Peter who is hungry to learn. His posture is humble and open—he wants to absorb Jesus' teachings like a wet sponge. He asks a question and might expect a straightforward answer: "How many times should I forgive?" Instead, Jesus' math is not predictable—it's infinite. Forgiveness is abundant; grace is not earned. In your own faith, do you find comfort in theological formulas? Do you wish for straightforward answers? Can you let go of black-and-white thinking and instead embrace the infinite colors of grace?

March 24, 2024 Palm Sunday

Scripture Lesson: Psalm 118:19-29
Message: Wandering Heart: "Songs of Loudest Praise"

As Holy Week begins, Peter is no longer front and center, and so we imagine he is with the rest of the disciples when Jesus enters Jerusalem on a colt. As they witness crowds shouting hosannas, the disciples are confused. When they look back on this experience, perhaps they will remember the songs. The singing is surely etched in their memories. As we imagine ourselves in the crowd on this day, may we remember that they are supposed to be praising Caesar, but instead they are shouting for the one entering the city on a donkey. Their singing is subversive, courageous, and contagious. Their praise shows the ripple effect of public displays of faith.

March 31, 2024 Easter

Liturgist: Carole Ford Easter Choir Performance Scripture Lesson: Psalm 16

Message: Wandering Heart: "And I Hope"

We might expect that, after denying Christ, Peter would cower in shame—or perhaps even run away in an attempt to leave his past behind him. Instead, when he hears the news from the women, he doesn't dismiss them like the other disciples. He gets up and runs to the tomb. When he peers into the empty tomb and sees the linen cloth, he is filled with awe. Even after the biggest failures, even after the worst case scenario has happened, can we run toward hope? Like Peter, will we keep going? Will we keep looking for God in our midst?

Love travels. Hope travels. Prayer travels.

The Operation Christmas Child shoe boxes we launched in November have landed in the hands of children on four continents and two Caribbean islands. Some of them travelled more than 12,000 miles from our sanctuary at the corner of Thorn and Broad streets.

Our 2023 boxes were distributed in the African nations of Zambia, Madagascar, Liberia, Burundi, South Africa and Kenya. Additional boxes were distributed in Ukraine, Honduras, Columbia, Ecuador, the Dominican Republic and the Bahamas. Some of our boxes were delivered to countries designated as "hard to reach" because of war or cultural, religious or custom issues, according to the OCC website. "Your prayerfully packed boxes ... provide a creative way for us and our ministry partners in these locations to share the Gospel in a culturally sensitive way."

In 13 years, the Fellowship of the Cross youth have led annual OCC drives that have produced more than 1,400 boxes. FOTC accepts donations year-round, hosts a packing party in late September or October and blesses the boxes in worship services before delivering them to a regional collection center in November. Collection boxes are located in the narthex and outside the church office. We accept donations of school supplies, small toys and stuffed animals, clothing such as socks and T-shirts, ball caps, jewelry, and personal items including toothbrushes, combs and brushes. We cannot accept toothpaste, bar soap, liquids of any kind, war-themed gifts or candy. 
There will be an indoor plan as well.



I feel like I am hypersensitive to prayer possibilities during Lent. Everything inspires another prayer.

On the night before Ash Wednesday, I attended a high school swim meeting. It was Senior Night, the home team's final meet. The bleachers were full of family and friends. The home team was winning in unexpected fashion. The energy was good.

In a high school meet, the strongest swimmers compete in the center lane. The less experienced,

less confident swimmers travel in the outside lanes. But while the Senior Night triumph was being shaped in

the center lanes, I noticed one of the coaches spending the evening supporting athletes in the outside lanes.


Coach was encouraging. Coach was connecting. I could see something positive happening in conversations before and after each race. The swimmers in the outside lane were being valued. Those swimmers were being seen. As their season ended, they walked away knowing their work, their dedication, their presence on the team, was appreciated and affirmed.

Can you remember being in high school, feeling invisible and ineffective, and hearing a teacher or a coach or a parent validate your work? I do. Encouraging words resonate.

I was inspired, and I found my first Lenten prayer. I found a prayer for all of us.

As the sun sets at 6:15 p.m. on Sunday, March 5, from wherever you are, with whomever wants to join you, let us pray together as we continue through the Lenten season.

"Lord, let us see each other, let us value each other, let us encourage and appreciate and support each other as we walk with you toward the cross. Let us see beyond the center lanes. Let us see the people moving in the outside lanes and ways to connect with them."



The night following Ash Wednesday, I heard a youth group leader (a former coach!) talking to middle schoolers. She said, "Some people give up sweets or caffeine or screen time for Lent, but I'm giving up negativity. My negativity sometimes keeps me from getting closer to Jesus."

Three days later, while attending a workshop in a church in Beaver County, I wandered into a middle school classroom. On the wall I found some interesting posters: "Be as quick to pray as you are to text" and "Faith is like Wi-Fi; it's invisible but it has the power to connect you to

what you need" There was a third, my favorite:

"CTR + ALT + DELETE.

Control yourself Alter your thinking Delete negativity"

In a youth leader's voice, and again on a classroom wall, I found our second Lenten prayer. Lord, help us all to eliminate the negativity in our attitudes and relationships. Help us remove all the attitudes that keep us from moving closer to you.

"In this time of war, we pray for the healing of hearts and the restoration of peace. May compassion prevail over hatred, and may the suffering of all those affected by the war be alleviated. Grant them strength, solace, and hope for a brighter and harmonious future. "... You are our Saviour, the one who taught us the real meaning of peace. Guide us and give us power to practice peace in our daily lives. Amen."

- 2. **Peripheral Arterial Disease Screening** An Ankle-Brachial Index (ABI) test is performed using blood pressure cuffs on the arms and legs. It is important to screen for PAD because it increases the risk of coronary artery disease, heart attack, or stroke.
- 3. **Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm** (AAA) An ultrasound is performed to screen the abdominal aorta for the presence of an enlargement or aneurysm. AAA can lead to a ruptured aortic artery, which is a serious medical emergency.
- 4. **Atrial Fibrillation** A 6-lead electrocardiogram (EKG) is performed by placing sensors on the arms and legs to screen for Atrial Fibrillation. AFib can lead to blood clots, stroke, and heart failure, and other heart-related complications.
