Fitness coaches will tell you to make a smaller achievable goal that can be fulfilled in a short time so that you can build off the momentum of success to ultimately achieve your big picture goal. The same is said when paying off your debt. It's called the snowball effect. You pay off the smallest bill first then put that payment onto the next small amount then put both of those payments onto the next small amount and the monthly payment gets bigger while the debt gets smaller. Thank you to all who have made soup and hummus, thank you to all who made the phone calls, took the money, handed it out, thank you to all who put the details in the announcements and on the bulletin board. Thank you for your continued faithfulness to one soup at a time, one month at a time, one year at a time for seven years of perfection and the completion of the Building of Faith loan. Thank you to those who have supported the sale and little by little contributed to the huge impact. Together we will continue to look for ways to faithfully serve.



May 7, 2023 Fifth Sunday of Easter Liturgist: Mitch Hortert Scripture Lesson: Psalm 36:5-9 Message: "Purpose and Rest Belongs to All Life Under Heaven"

Mahatma Gandhi said, "the greatness of a nation and its moral progress can be judged by the way its animals are treated." We understand that not all animals are dearly loved by us. Elizabeth Groff is the child we think of as we pack shoeboxes for Operation Christmas Child. She is the child who drives us to shop and share and pray through

every OCC campaign.

"I had no personal connection (to God). I didn't know how to pray. Nobody told me I could pray on my own," Groff said of her time as an orphan in Ukraine. "But I was crying out to him with everything I had And when Operation Christmas Child came to my orphanage, it felt like a direct response to my prayer."

Groff, now married, living in Texas and expecting her first child, shared her story in several Western Pennsylvania churches in April. It is an incredibly layered story of hope and love to consider as the Sewickley United Methodist family moves toward our 13th OCC campaign.

SUMC has contributed more than 1,300 shoeboxes since 2011, and each box is a window for His Light to reach children in ways we cannot imagine.

In January, Groff returned to Ukraine to deliver shoeboxes to orphans in a nation now savaged by war. She remembers an 8-year-old named Natalia who treasured a bright yellow flashlight she pulled from her OCC box.

"Natalia said the flashlight was her favorite gift because now, when the air raids begin and the city goes dark, she will have a light to lead her to safety. It broke my heart to think of that child in the darkness, but now I know she has the Light of Jesus."

Elizabeth's story begins in a village in southern Ukraine. She was happy at times, living with her grandparents and her half-sister, Tonya. They had a garden and some livestock. But happiness faded quickly. Her father died in an alcohol-related accident. Her mother became an alcoholic. Her grandparents were in failing health.

"I was the head of the house at 6 years old," she recalled. "I was taking care of everyone. I went from house to house in the village begging for food."

Her mother had a daughter who died of alcohol poisoning at seven months.

"I felt like it was my fault. I should have been taking better care of her."

In desperation, Elizabeth, then 7, and Tonya, then 5, boarded a bus and traveled toward a new life in another village. The driver never asked for tickets. In the new town, they collected empty bottles and returned them to a store, hoping to earn enough money to buy food. The clerk called authorities. They were taken to a detention center as their families were contacted.

"We were happy in the detention center. We had food and didn't have to worry about a place to stay."

Tonya's father came for her. No one came for Elizabeth.

"He said, I'm taking Tonya but I don't want you; you're not my daughter."

Elizabeth remembers Tonya turning to wave as she walked away with her father.

"She was smiling. She was happy. So I smiled for her, but inside I was heartbroken. She was all the family I had. I felt abandoned. I felt forgotten. No one cares. What's the point?"

In the orphanage, as an 8-year-old, Elizabeth received her OCC shoebox. She remembers crayons and a coloring book, lots of pink "girl accessories" and a bright yellow yo-yo. A window was opened.

"I didn't know how to use that yellow yo-yo, but it was my favorite," she said. "Those were the first gifts I ever received, and I knew then that I was loved and I wasn't forgotten. God hadn't forgotten me. The yo-yo represented hope."

Elizabeth traveled to the U.S. a member of the orphanage's chorus. The tour was designed to introduce orphans to families interested in adopting. One night, Elizabeth fell asleep in the back seat while traveling to spend the night with a host family. The father chose not to wake her and sat with her quietly in the car.

"While watching me sleep, he heard the voice of God say, This is your daughter and you are her father."

Elizabeth was adopted by the family in North Carolina. They attended a church that conducted annual Operation Christmas Child campaigns. Elizabeth made the connection while shopping in a Target store. Her mother intended to fill two boxes. Elizabeth suggested 100 boxes. They filled 168 that year and more than 200 the following year.

As a student at Virginia Tech, she launched campaigns that filled more than 8,000 boxes in her time on campus. She enlisted the football team.

"We had huge linemen packing boxes with tiny pink gifts for girls and writing the sweetest letters," she said.

Since graduation, she has witnessed around the country on behalf of OCC. She was surprised when she received a call from an agency in Ukraine that connects orphans who had been separated. They had seen her in an OCC video. The agency put her in touch with Tonya, who was still living in Ukraine. They had not seen each other in 20 years. They connected before the war, and since the war Tonya and her son have joined Elizabeth and her husband in Texas.

NOTE: The Fellowship of the Cross will be collecting shoebox contributions through September. Our past contributions have twice reached Ukraine, as well as Africa, South America and Central America.

Suggested donations include school supplies (pens, pencils, crayons, notebooks and glue sticks), wearables (T-shirts, socks, caps), personal grooming items (brushes, combs, adhesive bandages) and "wow" gifts such as dolls, balls, jewelry, hair accessories, toy cars. Flashlights and yo-yos are welcome!

We have already received enough toothbrushes, stuffed animals, sunglasses, scissors and rulers to accommodate 100 boxes. We're grateful to those who have made contributions through the winter. The FOTC donation box is located outside the church office, on a shelf beneath the bulletin board.

Let's pray for the professionals and the volunteers who nurture and mentor and encourage our children and youth.


As we move through the month, let's pray for the

- All references to the Church Council, Board of Trustees, Staff/ Pastor Parish Relations Committee, and Finance Committee, in all congregational policies as of _____, and in all references to the Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church, shall be understood to refer to the Leadership Board beginning ____.
- Once the budget is approved, those responsible (i.e., staff and team leaders) for the various ministry areas have the authority to spend their budget to align with the objectives for their ministry area approved by the pastor. No further approval is needed to access the budget in their area of responsibility.
- The pastor is responsible for reviewing line items within ministry areas with the appropriate staff or team leaders for accountability from the staff and to the board.
- 4. Any member of the Building Maintenance Team has the authority to purchase supplies for building maintenance and improvement up to \$50 without approval. The Building Maintenance Team leader can authorize purchases for building maintenance and improvement up to \$500. Purchases up to \$1,000 can be approved by the pastor. Any purchases over \$1,000 need Leadership Board approval unless the expenditure is already approved in a capital expenditure line item in the approved budget.
- 5. Any expenditure over \$10,000 will require three bids unless a vetted contractor is preferred. Preference will be given to hire local companies offering competitive bids within 5% of other bids. Minority and women owned businesses should be given the opportunity to submit bids. If the expenditure is already approved in the budget and meets the previous criteria, there is no further approval needed. The ministry team leader or staff member responsible for the purchase will provide documentation of the bids to the Leadership Board for purposes of a paper trail only.
- The treasurer must be consulted concerning any single purchase or expenditure over \$10,000 for purposes of cash flow. The treasurer does not approve or deny purchases but rather confirms large purchases will not create cash flow issues.
- 7. The Leadership Board will identify the positions that are authorized church issued credit cards and will establish credit card policies and limits.
- 8. Church purchases should be made using sales tax exemption.
- 9. Expenditures, other than recurring bills such as utilities, need to be submitted to the Treasurer for payment or reimbursement by completing a disbursement voucher with the receipt/invoice attached. The pastor, leadership board chair or ministry team leader whose budget funds are being used will sign the voucher as the approval authority. A person cannot approve funds to themselves or a family member.

- 10. The authority to hire and terminate employees of the church shall be vested in the Leadership Board. The pastor shall have the authority to advertise open positions and interview and recommend candidates to fill open staff positions. The Board shall have the sole authority to determine the number of staff positions, approve job descriptions for each staff member and set the salary paid to each staff member. The Leadership Board delegates to the pastor the authority to supervise, discipline, and manage paid staff as outlined in the SUMC Employee Handbook.
- 11. The pastor and a Leadership Board representative will review all paid staff annually using the approval evaluation process in the employee manual dated _____. The pastor will meet with team leaders at least quarterly to review, evaluate and revise, as necessary, the direction and focus of the team.
- 12. The Learning Tree Board is fully amendable and accountable to the Leadership Board and shall submit an annual budget and recommended policy changes to the Leadership Board.
- 13. The board recognizes and approves the Building Usage Policies dated _____.
- 14. The board recognizes and approves the Building Security and Key Policies dated _____.
- 15. The board recognizes and approves the Financial Control Policies dated _____.
- 16. The board recognizes and approves the SUMC Personnel Policies dated _____.
- 17. All meetings of the Leadership Board shall be open to the public, with the exception of any meeting or portion of a meeting in which a personnel matter or a matter of legal negotiations is considered. In those cases, the Board will transition into executive session. Minutes of executive session agenda items shall be available to all with the exception of those concerning personnel matters will be kept separately as part of the "S/ PPRC" files.
- 18. Leadership Board members are nominated by a separate and independent Committee on Nominations and Leadership Development, chaired by the pastor, and elected by the Charge Conference as described in the BOD. The Nominations Committee will be responsible for developing new leaders and equipping them for future Leadership Board positions.
- 19. Due to Leadership Board's serving as the congregation's Staff-Parish Relations Committee, no immediate family member of the pastor or other paid staff person may serve as a member of the Board, Due to serving as the congregation's Board of Trustees, only Leadership Board members over the age 18 will have voting privileges in matters of property, incorporation, legal matters, contracts, insurance, investments, or other matters described in the BOD ¶ 2525--2551.

SAFETY MINISTRY NEWS

An evacuation at SUMC may occur due to a fire, an active shooter on site, or a natural disaster. In the event of an immediate evacuation, on any Sunday, please follow the instructions of the Guardian on duty or follow your instincts and exit the building as quickly and safely as possible.

During worship service hours (9-noon), should evacuation be necessary, exit the church by walking (don't run) and gather in one of our 3 assembly locations to shelter in place until emergency personnel indicate it's safe to return:

- 1) The Pastor's Front Porch (home next door to playground, 333 Broad Street)
- St. Stephen's Church Door #12, adjacent to our parking lot. See picture to the right for the location.
- 3) AME Zion Church (corner of Walnut and Thorn Streets) any door will be open

When inside at SUMC, familiarize yourself with the nearest available exit doors and the above evacuation locations.

All children in the nursery and Sunday School classes will be evacuated at the guidance of their caregiver/ teacher.

Are you worried about the disaffiliation happening in our denomination? Are you thinking about our potential change to a SAS model – Simplified, Accountable Structure for SUMC? Is there something during worship service that you desire to add or change? Other? Please let me know.

WHAT ABOUT WESLEY?

During this time which our church is in the media, I thought it might be helpful to remind ourselves why we love being Methodists. Over the next few newsletters, I will share highlights of John Wesley's life and theology which serves as our Methodist foundation.

While at Oxford in 1737, John and his brother Charles formed a religious organization called the "Holy Club" with other students at Oxford. They decided to conduct their lives based on rules and methods, so they called themselves "Methodists" for the methodical way in which they carried out their Christian faith.

When John Wesley traveled to Georgia at the request of Governor Oglethorpe, he worked as a missionary to the Native Americans. On the ship to America, he met a band of Moravian missionaries. He was impressed by their spiritual strength and joy in the Lord. During a terrible storm, the Moravians remained calm and faithful and continued to worship the Lord. Inspired, Wesley talked with the Moravians throughout the storm and into the night discussing evangelistic preaching, instantaneous conversion, and holiness.

Two years later, John Wesley returned from America in despair as he considered his mission a failure. He and his methods were not accepted by the settlers. Back in England, Wesley struggled with his sins and his desire for salvation. He received spiritual counsel from Peter Boehler, a Moravian leader he met on the ship. Boehler taught Wesley about instantaneous conversion by faith alone. Wesley, supported by Boehler's guidance, began to **extemporaneously pray** whenever he desired. Wesley read scriptures and prayed for an understanding and experience of salvation through faith.

On May 24, 1738, during a Fetter Lane Society meeting at Aldersgate, Wesley experienced God's saving grace and wrote, "I felt I did trust in Christ alone for salvation; and an assurance was given me that He had taken away my sins, even mine, and saved me from the law of sin and death."

What is an extemporaneous prayer? An extemporaneous prayer is one that you create from your heart. It is an impromptu prayer which enables you to talk to our Creator intimately. There is no specific liturgy with memorized words. Extemporaneous prayers are ones that are very special to Methodists as we believe that we have a direct line to God, and we can share anything with him at any time.

- Practice: 1) Talk to God as though he is sitting next to you and tell him what is on your mind
 - 2) Start now and don't put it off
 - 3) Be honest with God He is your Creator
 - 4) Do it frequently
