ORNAMENTS FOR ORPHANS In November, look for the "O4O" tree at the back of the sanctuary. The Fellowship of the Cross has renewed its relationship with Ornaments 4 Orphans. For three years before the pandemic interrupted our worship, FOTC had been selling Christmas decorations and gifts from Ornaments 4 Orphans, a fair trade social enterprise dedicated to providing critical support for orphans and vulnerable children. The ornaments are created by artisans in Kenya, Uganda, Nepal and Peru, and the money is returned to the artisans or invested in homes, schools and medical facilities in their communities. O4O uses ethical and sustainable business practices to advance society by creating jobs, which fights poverty, preserves intact families, empowers communities, and ultimately prevents children from becoming orphans. We will be selling Christmas ornaments, nativity sets, jewelry and stocking stuffers from a tree in the rear of the sanctuary. We will be there before, between, and after worship services. 100% of the proceeds from our sale are returned to Ornaments 4 Orphans.

SEEKING TO DEEPEN YOUR SPIRITUAL JOURNEY?

Consider exploring your relationship with God by working with a Spiritual Companion. Pastor Dora J. Odarenko is beginning her third year of training to be a spiritual companion, and is currently under supervision She is now welcoming clients, pro bono. You may contact her at 203-556-5076 or djodarenko@yahoo.com. "As your Spiritual Companion, I will invite you into



the process of understanding yourself more deeply on a spiritual level. My Guild for Spiritual Guidance—started over 40 years ago by Henri Nouwen, John Yungblut, Nan Merrill, Madeleine L'Engle, and others—uses the term "Spiritual Companion" rather than "Spiritual Director" because this will be a listening, questioning, responding, and prayerful relationship, meant to help you understand yourself more fully on a spiritual level. I will not be a top-down professional "authority." The aim of Spiritual Companioning is to give you a spiritual friend in this unfolding life journey that can be challenging and perplexing, as well as joyous. It is good to have a support and guide in times that can be as stressful and demanding as ours. The goal of a dedicated and trained Spiritual Companion is not to push you in a particular direction, but rather to support you as you reflect on experiences, memories, or dreams. Like Spiritual Directors, we follow strict guidelines for ethical conduct; conversations are strictly confidential. Hour-long monthly sessions are private and sacred times together. As such, they will not simply be times for chatting about the week or for venting or for receiving advice. Your commitment will be to invite God into what you are experiencing and to explore ways in which a Divine Presence is working in your life. My commitment, as your spiritual friend, is to stand beside you."

Stop the Bleed and Church Safety Training Saturday, November 12, 10am- 12:15



This two-part program is designed to train, educate and inform our church members and volunteers.

Making our Church Part One — 10 – 11:15am: In the unlikely event of active shooter casualties, police officers are Safe for All focused on subduing the shooter. If emergency personnel are delayed in any way, it's up to us to help each other survive a blood loss incident. We have invited the Valley Ambulance Authority to present a hands-on training program to stop blood loss and how to use a tourniquet.

Part Two — 11:15 – 12 noon: Sandra Lane and Pastor Hannah will continue the training with a review of the various safety and security procedures we currently have in place at SUMC, along with active shooter, evacuation and Safe Sanctuary protocols.

We hope you will join us for this very important program. Please consider attending both sessions. A sign up sheet is on the table in the back of the sanctuary.

Our Sanctuary was finished in 1884, which makes the sanctuary 138 years old. However, the church (the body of Christ, the people) were officially recognized through incorporation on November 13, 1852. That will make the official body 170 years old this November. If we keep going back, in 1839 they actually began to build the physical structure of the church building

which was two years after they began meeting as a congregation in 1837. We have an impressive history and we have an impressive future ahead of us!

On November 13th, we will celebrate the congregation's 170 years of being incorporated. This might not fall into the typical number when you pull out the big celebrations, but it does offer us an excuse. As the church continues to live and grow, the structure continues to adapt to the needs of the ministry God has called us to at Sewickley United Methodist Church. In 2014 the sanctuary was rededicated after a major renovation. As we look ahead and continue to grow and adapt, there will no doubt be more renovations to come that keep us up to date. However, at this time in our history, we still have a financial obligation for this most recent renovation.

It is with much excitement that I can now say we are just roughly \$2,400 away from our goal. When you prepare to celebrate someone's birthday, you think about what gift you can bring. I am so thankful for all the gifts you bring to our church. I am



thankful for the ways your presence, your service and your financial gifts have impacted the Sewickley community and the kingdom of God. Through your faithfulness people have been fed, clothed, had their mobility needs cared for, felt loved and safe and welcomed with open arms. received the good news of the gospel message of Christ. Through the faithfulness of Christ, we continue to be called to be movers and shakers for the kingdom of God. Through the faithfulness of Christ, we continue to be provided for and blessed with plenty to go around.

I loved David's Thanksgiving. I share the story in Children's Church every year.

In 1 Chronicles, splashed across chapters 15 through 17, we see David bringing the Ark of the Covenant in to Jerusalem. He calls thousands of people to join him. He asks choirs to sing and musicians to play trumpets and cymbals, harps and lyres. He dances.

David provides food (a loaf of bread, a cake of dates and a cake of raisins) for every man and woman to take home.


And then David shares a song he has written: "Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good. His love endures forever."

David's gratitude can be seen and heard and tasted. It can be felt in his words: "Sing to the Lord, all the earth, proclaim his salvation day after day. Declare his glory among nations, his marvelous deeds among all peoples."

Then, in the first paragraphs of 1 Chronicles 17, David is at home in the palace, looking to the future, when Nathan the Prophet enters with encouraging news.

"Whatever you have in mind, do it, for God is with you," Nathan said.

I'm not suggesting that God rewards grateful people. I'm suggesting that when you look for God in the world, and you recognize all that he has done, and all that he is doing, possibility is amplified. Opportunity becomes apparent. Imagination and energy increase. Gratitude reminds us that



God is with us and he is moving, and he's inviting us to move with him.

Let's lift prayers of gratitude together.

On **November 6**, as the sun sets at around 5:12 pm, from wherever you are, with whomever wants to join you, let's lift big prayers of thanksgiving for his provision and protection, his availability and imagination and inexhaustible energy. Let's be thankful for our past year as a

church family, let's be thankful for His presence in our families, our neighborhoods, our friendships, our workplaces, our schools ...

Let's recite some of the lyrics of David's song, found at 1 Chronicles 16:8-36. Feel its energy and its certainty and its hope.

And's let's pray for God to show us opportunities to make our gratitude seen and heard and tasted and felt throughout this month of Thanksgiving. Dance and sing, if you like, but let's ask for ways to "declare his glory" in small ways, to seniors, to children, to neighbors, to co-workers, to first-responders and public servants, to teachers, to medical personnel, to the people we see every week but don't know their names.

Let's ask God to help us create communities where, as it is written in 1 Chronicles 16:37, "... all the people said "Amen" and "Praise the Lord."

NYADIRE CLINIC CHALLENGE

Based in Pittsburgh and founded in 2006, The Nyadire Connection (TNC) is a faith based, all-volunteer, non-profit organization that partners with the Nyadire United Methodist Mission in Zimbabwe. The Mission includes a hospital, which has responsibility for six rural health clinics. These clinics serve as a critical medical care facility for women to deliver babies and for people with infectious diseases; patients often walk many miles to a clinic.



Yet, the clinics have been in disrepair, with no running water, flush toilets or electricity, and not enough space. Several years ago, TNC began a program to renovate the clinics, in partnership with Nyadire and the Zimbabwe Ministry of Health. To date, five clinics have been rebuilt, on-time and on-budget. We're now working on the final clinic, Chindenga, and we need your help.

A generous couple in the Pittsburgh District have made a challenge grant to TNC: They will match every dollar we raise up to \$25,000, which means we can receive \$50,000 if we "meet the match." The total cost of rebuilding Chindenga is \$350,000, so if we can "meet the match," we will have made great progress. We ask you to prayerfully consider making a tax-deductible donation to TNC. Donations may be made through SUMC. Write "Nyadire Clinic" in the memo line. The deadline to make contributions toward the match is November 30.



Life Line Screening, the nation's leading provider of preventive health screenings, will offer affordable, non-invasive and painless health screenings at Sewickley United Methodist Church on Wednesday, November 30.

A package of five screenings to identify risk for stroke, heart disease and other chronic conditions will be offered:

- 1. Carotid Artery Screening (Plaque) An ultrasound is performed to screen the carotid arteries (a pair of blood vessels in the neck that deliver blood to your brain) for buildup of fatty plaque. This buildup, called atherosclerosis, is one of the leading causes of stroke.
- 2. Peripheral Arterial Disease Screening An Ankle-Brachial Index (ABI) test is performed using blood pressure cuffs on the arms and legs. It is important to screen for PAD because it increases the risk of coronary artery disease, heart attack, or stroke.
- 3. Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm (AAA) An ultrasound is performed to screen the abdominal aorta for the presence of an enlargement or aneurysm. AAA can lead to a ruptured aortic artery, which is a serious medical emergency.
- 4. Atrial Fibrillation A 6-lead electrocardiogram (EKG) is performed by placing sensors on the arms and legs to screen for Atrial Fibrillation. AFib can lead to blood clots, stroke, and heart failure, and other heart-related complications.2
- 5. Osteoporosis Risk An ultrasound is performed to measure the shin bone for abnormal bone mass density. This can help assess the risk of osteoporosis, a disease where bones become weak and brittle.

These 5 vital screenings cost \$149 and take 60-90 minutes to complete. Register by calling toll free 1-888-653-6441, text the word "circle" to 797979 or online at https://llsa.social/HS.
